WASHINGTON'S GROWTH

Our neighbor on the north now claims a population of 847,000. In 1880 the U S census gave the population of Washington at 11,594 and that of Oregon at 52,465. In 1900 the population of Oregon was 413,586 and that of Washington 518,103.

It is difficult to determine why Washington is outgrowing Oregon in population: Oregon has 56,850 more square miles than Washington. Oregon has as good, if not better climate than Washington, its soil is equal but it is not growing as fast and why? That is the problem our people will do well to study.

By the number of signatures that are being secured to the various petitions throughout the state, asking that the general appropriation bill be referred to the direct vote of the people, it is more than probable that the required number will be secured. The basis of this proposed opposition to the act of the legislature is the anti-normal school sentiment. Some believe in their abolishment, others favor two instead of four, others prefer one central normal school located at Portland. It is quite evident that if under the present feeling if left to the people they would be voted out of existence. This does not necessarily mean that by so doing the best interests of the state moved be subserved.

Evidence is accumulating that John W. Gates does not shoulder all the loss occasioned by the collapse of the May wheat deal. The \$1,500,000 contribution of Banker Bigelow, of Milwaukee, was sufficient to satisfy at least a few of the bears. The victims of the defunct Coe Commission Company dropped something over \$600,000 into the speculative hopper, and there are others who failed to get their names in the paper, but who probably lost more in proportion to the size of their bank accounts, than the redoubtable financial buccaner whose name will last in wheat-pit history as another father of a deal that failed.

Russia's desire to whip Turkey in order to prove Muscovite prowess is a reminder of the schoolboy who, being unable to whip a comrade much smaller than himself, showed his courage by making faces at the sister of the boy who "licked him." Russia has not yet been able to whip Japan. "It may not be able to do so, but it can make faces from behind the mountains at a weaker power, such as Turkey. This will be well provided the demonstration against the Turk goes no farther. But it may be well to remember that another Nicholas tried to whip Turkey and failed.—Statesman.
