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CHICAGO STRIKE
GETS NO BETTER

Chicago May 1—May day opened on the third day of the teamsters strike, and found no apparent disposition on the part of either party to call the affair off. At yesterday's conference the strike leaders developed no alternative but to continue the strike to the bitter end, as no signs of conciliation were vouchsafed from the employers who continue relentlessly in their determination to destroy the teamsters union. This morning five hundred colored strike breakers arrived by special train from St. Louis.

MORE TEAMSTERS QUIT

One hundred and thirty additional teamsters struck this morning. The greater number of the new recruits to the list of the strikers were in the employ of Durand & Kasper, wholesale grocers. These men refused to deliver goods to the firms who were on the boycott list.

PREPARE FOR LEGAL FIGHT

The strike leaders today retained Clarence Darrow to defend those who were indicted by the Grand Jury last April.

THREW ACID

While passing the city hall this afternoon eleven caravan wagons belonging to the Perbs teaming company and the Sprague Warner Company were assaulted with missiles. Eggs which had been filled with acid were also thrown at the drivers. The wagon drivers drew their black jacks and revolvers, but before they could fire were arrested. The arrested men are said to be imported strike breakers who arrived this morning from St. Louis.

FARLEY ARRIVES

Strike breaker Farley arrived this morning from New York. He held a conference of representative employers and it is understood that he will be placed in charge of all strike breakers in the city. Farley has quite a reputation as a strike breaker as he is accredited with having won the subway strike in New York City and the

railway strike at Chicago. The strike breakers who arrived from St. Louis were distributed and placed upon the teams of the Employers Teaming Company without being molested by the strikers.

STRIKE BREAKERS STRIKE

One hundred strike breakers employed by the express companies went on a strike this morning in order to enforce their demand for five dollars per day for drivers, and four dollars per day for helpers. The increase was granted and the strikers resumed work.

MORE TROUBLE AHEAD

Under the leadership of F J Conroy, a noted strike breaker, and guarded by forty armed detectives, who were sworn in as deputy United States Marshals, the St. Louis delegation of negroes arrived and were put to work to drive wagons at two dollars and a half per day. This element it is thought will most likely precipitate disorder. In order to meet this condition all available strength of the police department which represents a thousand men will be thrown into the struggle. In an interview this morning with Chief of Police O'Neill, he stated that there will be no tempering. Traffic must be unimpeded and all disorder must stop. The police have instructions to search all suspects for concealed arms, and arrests will follow each case where arms are found. Contempt proceedings will be commenced today against those accused of violating the federal injunction.

DEATH RESULTED

Richard Cummings who was run down and injured by Union teamsters last Friday died from his injuries this morning.

SOLDIERS AND POLICE CLASH

Lieutenant Hankins and fifty men members of the eighth Illinois national guard who were placed on

guard duty at the docks of the International S. S. Company this morning and the police who claimed that the soldiers had no right there, made a descent upon them and took their gun away from them, and arrested two of them resisted.

RETURN TO WORK

At three thirty this afternoon thirty-one drivers for the Patterson Coal Company joined the strikers. Several shots were fired this afternoon at non-union strike breakers who were driving coal wagons when the drivers were near the custom house building at noon. The negroes drew their revolvers and fired into the crowd, though there has been no report to the effect that any one was injured.

All non-union drivers who were arrested for carrying concealed weapons were released and went back to work this afternoon.

WILL NOT INTERFERE

Glennwood Springs May 1—Secretary Leob left this morning for the President's camp. He has a number of important papers and communications for the President. He expects to find the President's camp east of the divide where the first camp was located. It is authoritatively stated that no attention will be paid to the Chicago strike. If the strikers petition is presented, the strike leaders will be told that the President can not interfere with local matters.

ONE THOUSAND RIFLES

Superintendent Reed of the teaming company, admitted this afternoon that his company has purchased one thousand rifles with which to arm the non-union teamsters tomorrow. Chief of Police O'Neill instructed his men to "make no attempts to prevent men carrying rifles as the men were clearly within the law so long as weapons were not concealed."

Motion Denied

STILL ANOTHER

Warsaw May 1.—Still another collision is reported in which it is stated that the police and the soldiers fired into a crowd of workmen and killed twenty and wounded as many more.

THIRTY ONE KILLED

Another clash occurred here today between the government and the citizens. Several thousand people were marching through the streets bearing banners and red flags. The soldiers attempted to break up the demonstration and a clash occurred. Both cavalry and infantry charged the citizens the horsemen using sabers savagely and the infantry fired several volleys. The official report given the number killed at thirty one and the wounded fifteen. Many fell at the first volley and the crowd scattered. Latter the crowd reassembled and more trouble is feared and blood shed is imminent.

RUSTLERS

A number of the leading stockmen of this county met in this city Saturday afternoon and organized an association which will be known as the Grande Ronde Stockgrowers Protective Association. This association is made necessary from the fact that stock "rustlers" have been operating in this valley to an extent which calls for some stringent regulations. It is firmly believed that this association will take the proper steps to at least cause the stock stealing business to be somewhat dangerous as well as interesting. The Association does not intend to leave any stone unturned which will in any way impede the successful progress of the class of men who make life a burden to the honest stock grower.

Every case of stock loss will be reported to the Association and no expense will be spared to ferret out and discover the cause of the loss and the parties responsible for the loss. If it is thought by the Association that stock has been stolen, or run off the range the persons found to be responsible will receive prompt attention at the hands of the law and the association will lend its self to the officers with what information it may have at its command and all the funds necessary to enforce the law.
