Next Sunday the evening services in
the churches will commence at eight
o'clock as is usual during the summer
schedule.

Mr. E. Ray Jones of this city, left
for Sumpter, at which place he has
accepted a position as book keeper in
one of the big mining companies.

Mr. George Moenkhouse, of the Will-
amette valley, who arrived in this city
last Sunday, is looking for a location
left this forenoon for North Powder.

The supreme court meets in Pendle-
ton today. One of the most important
cases will be Umatilla vs the O. R. & N.
Co. This is the taxation case where
the assessor assessed the railroad track
at about \$14,000 per mile.

The Brandon woolen mill is about

a thorough examination he is of the
opinion that the frost did no injury to

Mr. F. S. Bramwell stated to an Ob-
server representative today that this
week would end the beet planting. In
all 3900 acres will have been seeded,
an excess of 1200 acres more than any
previous season and that the company
now has 5000 acres in sight for next
year. Beet culture is just beginning to
be an industry in this valley. We
have demonstrated that this is a pro-
fitable vocation and from this time
on we will grow sugar beets. We did
quite well last year and each follow-
ing year will see still greater increase.
