The thieves eluded them by having relays of saddle animals. The officers secured about 50 head of horses. One of the horse thieves, Riley, was in Baker City three weeks ago.

## Oregon's Birthday

On May 2, 1843 the few American, then in Oregon met at Champeog, on the bank of the Willamette river and entered into a provisional government that may, in truth, be considered the birth of Oregon as an American organized community. There were 102 Americans gathered there that day under the native forest trees, but one of whom is now known to be alive: the Hon F X Mathews, and he is 88 years old.

After a life of nearly 30 years, the St Paul, Minn., Globe, the oldest morning paper in the state, suspended on April 31. The Globe was the organ of the Democratic paper in the state. The assigned cause, it did not pay expenses.

In the evening the people will be treated to a great lecture by Dr. J H Coleman of the Willamette University on "The Symmetrical Character."
