Rev Dr G B Smyth, late of Foo Chow China, held the platform for an hour and a half in a simple, compact synopsis of foreign missionary work in general, but China in particular, quoting largely from his own experience during twenty years stay in the Orient. The forenoon was devoted to organization and the appointment of committees and the report of the presiding elder, J D Gillilan, which showed a healthy condition throughout the district, eleven charges in all, Baker City, Enterprise, Elgin, Flora, Haines, John Day, Joseph, La Grande, Sumpter, Union and Wallowa.

At 11 o'clock, Rev. E M Hill of Baker City responded to the topic "Aggressive Evangelism." He stated that the church "needed men, not machinery," men to go after the work with the aggressive spirit of Paul.

Dr. Smyth led the discussion and referred to the spirit of the evangelization now in progress all over the Pacific coast. The ladies had lunch prepared in the church and few there were who did not remain and enjoy the social hour. "The Preacher Outside the Pulpit" was the subject assigned to L F Wheeler of Joseph, who divided the subject into three parts, the preacher, the pulpit and the outsider, what kind of a man he is, the character of the church he has and the dominating thought of the community. The key note of his address was that the preacher to accomplish the best work must use tact and take cognizance of the conditions and character of the people with whom he is supposed to be in reach of.

At 3:30 Rev. Wheeler spoke on the "Official Board, its uses and abuses." Taking the position that official boards who carry the burden, are as divinely called as is the pastor, and their duties are as sacred. The janitor is as necessary as the pastor, and more important than the choir, for the reason the best choir in the kingdom cannot fill a cold church. He advised his hearers to read "Our Lay Office Bearers" by G F Oliver.

As we go to press H J Hockenberry superintendent of the La Grande public schools is delivering an address on "How best to maintain a hold upon the youth of the church."
