Mr. Palmer Better

Joseph Palmer, president of the
Farmers & Traders National Bank, who
was seriously injured Saturday after-
noon by falling from the wood frame
on Fox hill, a distance of about sixteen
feet, recovered consciousness Sunday

ed quite easy last night. He was in-
jured in several places about the head
which were thought at first to be frac-
tures, but the most painful and ser-

able to have it set until this morning.

THE BIG ENGINES HAVE ARRIVED

The big freight engines for the O R
& N which have been expected for some
time, arrived in the city Friday night.
There are six of the engines, and they
are most assuredly marvels of strength
and mechanical beauty. These six
ponderous mountain climbers are num-
bered from 350 to 355 inclusive. They
were built at the Baldwin Locomotive
Works at Philadelphia, and on the
trip here each two engines was in
charge of a caretaker, who looked after
them on the long journey across the
continent. The cabs of the engines
were boarded up comfortably and se-
curely on the inside, and the three in
which the caretakers made the jour-
ney were easily arranged with a bunk,
a stove for heating and cooking, and
the necessary utensils for preparing a
meal. Some of the running gear of the
engines were left off in the shipment,
and these are being rapidly put on by
the workmen in the yards at this place.
Two of the locomotives have been put
on their trial trips. The monsters
weigh, engine and tank, when fully
equipped with water and coal, one
hundred and eighty seven tons. The
tank holds seven thousand gallons,
the cylinders are twenty two by thirty
inches, and the drive wheels are
fifty seven inches in height. And this
shipment should, if there is any virtue
in a rabbit's foot, be a lucky lot of en-
gines. Especially should the engineer
and fireman of No 354, as well as the
rest of the train crew, feel lucky and
safe, for while a number of specta-
tors were viewing the engine the day
after its arrival, one of them discov-
ered a rabbit's foot (of course it was the
left hind foot of a grave yard rabbit,
shot at twelve o'clock at night on the
full of the moon) in a shallow open
receptacle above one of the drivers.
The rabbit's foot was covered with
dust, showing that it had lain there
for a long time and had been brought
many miles over mountains and through
deserts.

The forty or more who attended the
