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128 cubic feet to the cord. 16-inch dry chain wood \$3 per cord. This is cheaper than by the load. You pay for what you get and get what you pay for.

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## LA GRANDE AT WALLA WALLA

It was the good fortune of one of the editors of this paper to accompany the La Grande High School track team to Walla Walla, and witness the field sports on the Whitman field. While it is true that the La Grande team did not succeed in gaining many points as regards the events, they did secure many pointers which will be of value to them in future meets. Raymond McKennon was the only La Grande who succeeded in gaining a place on the field sports, and is therefore entitled to the honor of saving the day for the La Grande team. He finished third in the two hundred and twenty yard dash, and thereby making the only point for the La Grande High School. This race was won by Cox of Whitman, in twenty three minutes and two fifths seconds.

In the evening at the oratorical contest, Miss Naomi Williamson, of La Grande, was awarded second place. This is no mean victory, when we take into consideration the fact that Miss Williamson was in competition with some ten of the very best readers the Inland Empire could produce.

The treatment accorded the visiting teams by the Whitman pupils and teachers, was all that could be desired. Nothing was left undone which could in any way make the stay of the visitors more pleasant, and the La Grande visitors will certainly always have a warm place in their hearts for Whitman college.

### Antitoxine

During the past few months there has been more or less comment regarding the efficacy of the use of antitoxine and, on Saturday by accident, we stepped into the office of Drs. Biggers & Biggers, and, in mentioning the subject, Dr. G. W. Biggers stated that the most difficult thing in regard to the administering of this well known remedy for diphtheria is the mistaken notion the people have as to the deleterious effects of large doses on the heart, and as a matter of fact, the action of antitoxine on the human system, in any dose is absolutely inert, excepting its power to neutralize or destroy the diphtheria toxins in the system and, aside from an occasional breaking out of a rash (urticaria) which only manifests itself after the patient became convalescent, and lasts but a day or two, and is of no significance. While in mild or ordinary cases of diphtheria affecting the pharynx and tonsils only, doses are seldom required above from 3000 to 6000 units. When the mucous membrane of the nose and larynx are involved and the case becomes one of profound diphtheric intoxication, the doses must not be regulated by the number of units given, but by the amount required to counteract the diphtheria poison; and all the way from 10,000 to 20,000 units may be given at one dose with impunity and repeated if necessary. Small doses in grave cases are absolutely useless. As well might we attempt to put out a burning building with a bucket full of water. In a recent case in this city, wherein myself and Dr. Molitor were associated, we gave 85,000 units within sixty hours in doses varying from 10,000 to 19,000 units and the patient showed great improvement after each dose. Our authorities record a case where a negro, who was considered to be in the last stages, was revived and his life saved after having been given 230,000 units, given in doses up to 50,000 units within thirty hours.

## THE NEW YORK EPIDEMIC

Cerebro spinal meningitis is very prevalent in New York City. Old school doctors have confessed their inability to cure it, but Osteopaths, when called in, are meeting with good success. They simply loosen up the spine and remove all obstructions to perfect circulation; and the germ of the disease cannot exist in tissue which has a good supply of pure blood and is perfectly drained.

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## HELD TO ANSWER TO GRAND JURY

Chicago, May 15.—Charles J. Casey, business agent of the Carriage and Wagon Makers Union No. 6, charged with being accessory to the crime of murder in bringing about the "slugging" of Charles J. Carlstrom, a non-union wagon maker, waived examination before Justice Prindiville today and was held to the grand jury without bail. The other union officers arrested with Casey in connection with the death of Carlstrom, George Miller, H. J. Newman, John Heiden and Frank Novak, were also arraigned and held under heavy bail for a hearing on May 25th. Charles Gilhooley, Edward Feeley and Mark Looney, the alleged sluggers, are being held pending the coroner's inquest on the body of Carlstrom. Gilhooley has made a practical confession.

### Two More Cases

Two more cases of diphtheria were discovered in the Old Town this morning. The cases are in the family of Mrs. Herr, who resides on Fourth street. Mrs. Herr does the family washing for a certain family, but this morning she telephoned to the lady for whom she was to work, that she could not come on account of the illness of one of the children. The lady asked Mrs. Herr what the trouble seemed to be and received the answer that the little one had a sore throat. This was enough for the lady to understand that it was her duty to call the attention of the authorities to the case. She called up Marshal Rayburn who notified Dr. Richardson, and the two of them went to the house and discovered two well developed cases of diphtheria, and Dr. Richardson instructed the Marshal to place a green flag on the gate, and establish a rigid quarantine. The general public is reminded that this is ideal weather to fumigate, and that though there is no evidence of diphtheria in your home, everyone should use every means in their power to prevent the disease from getting a foothold. Fumigate, whether you have the disease in the house or not.
