Seven Thousand Names

Salem Or., May 17—President Hendricks of the referendum committee arrived in Salem yesterday with 7,018 names attached to petitions asking that the mammoth appropriation bill of the last session of the legislature be referred to the people for their approval or rejection. The petitions were not filed with the secretary of state, however, as the one from Multnomah county, bearing 1,500 names, had not been certified by the county clerk of that county. Although Hendricks had about 1,000 more names than were necessary without counting those from Multnomah, he decided to hold them all until these would be certified and file them all at once. This will probably be done either Wednesday or Thursday. The time for filing ends Friday night at 12 o'clock.

Indians Fish

Washington May 17—In an opinion by Justice McKenna the supreme court of the United States today decided the case of Thomas Thompson and White Swan, representing the Yakima Indian nation of the state of Washington, against Winans brothers. The case involved the right of the Indians to take fish from the Columbia river under the treaty of 1850. The case was decided against the Indians by the circuit court for the district, but that decision was reversed by today's opinion.

"It was the permission of the state to use a peculiar device," the court held. "What rights the Indians had were not determined or limited. This was a matter for judicial determination regarding the rights of the Indians and rights of the respondents."
