RUSSIAN ATTACKS WERE REPULSED

Tokio May 24.—An official report from field headquarters says that at two o'clock Sunday afternoon, a Russian battalion of infantry and six squadrons of cavalry attacked the heights North of Chénaygepo, but were repulsed. Another Russian force advanced on Chien Chen Tau Monday, but were also driven off. The Russian cavalry on the right bank of the Liao river began to retreat Monday, and at five in the afternoon had reached a point South of Ta Tuen, seventeen miles West of Fakomen.

Twenty Four Injured

Warsaw, May 24.—Reports from Siedlce state that a revolutionist hurled a bomb at the chief of police who was returning from an entertainment at about midnight. Twenty four were injured, including the chief. Five of the victims are in a serious condition.

200,000 in School

General Anderson, U S A., who has just returned from service in the Philippine Islands, in a recent address showing that the natives have been benefited by the American rule there, said: "There are now 200,000 native children attending the common schools established by Uncle Sam there, where as under the Spanish rule there were none."

Foundry For Lease

Salem Or May 24.—Superintendent O W James of the penitentiary yesterday began advertising for bids for the leasing of the stove foundry at the prison and for the labor of the convicts therein. The present contract, which is with the Loewenberg-Going company of Portland, expires July 29.

Superintendent James stated yesterday that by this means he hoped to secure a better contract for the state. Under this contract the convicts are earning for the state 3½ cents an hour, while the foundry buildings with water power furnished are rented for \$2,000 a year. Under the present contract the company is compelled to employ only 100 men at a time. About a month ago it took advantage of this privilege and cut down the force from 240 to 100, thus leaving 140 idle men to be taken care of as best they can. About half this number have been put to work on the county roads, while the others are breaking stone for road dressing.

Oregon State Grange

Every county in the state is represented at the thirty second annual convention began yesterday at Forest Grove by the Oregon state grange. The program covers four days and is one of unusual interest to the progressive farmers of the state. Among the many topics slated for discussion are good roads, assessment and taxation, education, pure food, railroad rates and several matters relating to the internal affairs of the order. A large number of women are among the delegates and they will have a prominent part in the proceedings.

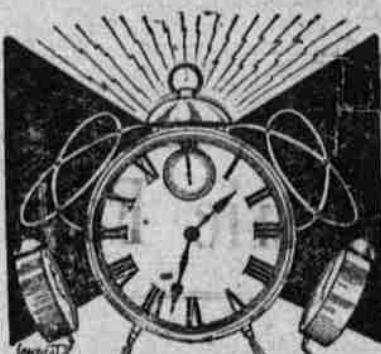
