A Short Sketch of the Author of
Stories of Old Oregon

Authors of popular books, however modest, can never elude public attention. Once interested in a book we want to know the writer.

Stories of Old Oregon is attracting so much attention by its thrilling sketches of frontier life and humorous anecdotes of early settlement of the West, that our readers will be interested in a brief sketch of the author's life.

When ten years of age he crossed the plains with his father's family which settled in Linn Co., Oregon in 1852. In 1861 the author then a boy of nineteen went to the Oro Fino mines in Idaho from there he followed the rush to Elk City, Florence, Boise, Borne, Silver City, Rocky Bar, Auburn and other camps of lesser note. The winter of 62 and 63 he spent in Grand Ronde valley having located the place now occupied by Summerville. Many old settlers will remember him as the pioneer in that once thriving borg.

He seems to have been of a roving disposition and, as he says in one of his sketches, unwilling to camp in the same place twice. His friends, and he has many of them, speak of him as being in the early days a bold courage ous adventurer, a crack shot with rifle or pistol generous to a fault and the prince of story tellers around the camp fire. For many years he was a freighter on the road from Wallula and the Umatilla landing to the Bote basin and neighboring camps.

In 1865 he was married to the daughter of John Scott, a pioneer in this valley and settled in Walla Walla Washington where he ran for the Territorial Legislature but unfortunately as he says he made too many speeches and was defeated. Fifteen years later he represented Benton Co. in the Oregon Legislature. With the late Senator Slater he served a term as State Rail Road Commissioner and later he joined the rush to the gold fields of Alaska, where he spent five years among the glaciers. His first venture in the north was to purchase a schooner and become a sailor, sailing around among the islands in south-eastern Alaska for a year in search of gold. On receiving an appointment as collector and inspector of customs at White Pass he took charge of the station at the boundary line between Canada and the United States where he remained four years.

For many years when opportunity offered he has written sketches of what was passing around him for the local paper and sometimes for the magazines. He probably has as large a circle of personal acquaintances and friends as any one in the state. Being a close observer, an ardent admirer of generous and heroic action, his mind has become a storehouse of incidents showing the brighter and nobler side of human nature. Humorous without levity, philosophical without pedantry and serious without cant, he impresses one as being a man who sees only the best and brightest along the path of life and who will leave behind him lasting impressions of his own pleasing personality. A half hour's conversation reveals the man and discloses the charm of his writing. Always a man of action he makes no boast but delights in bringing to notice the merit of others. It has been said the most thrilling sketches in his book are only accounts of his own exploits but takes no credit to himself and nowhere poses for applause.

At the age of sixty two he is still a strong and vigorous man, looking forward to new enterprises with all the enthusiasm of a boy. In fact he is a typical pioneer and lately said to a friend that this country was getting too thickly settled up and he was thinking of looking about for a new camping place.
