**A Wise Mule**

Brooklyn courts opened late, cross-town street cars were held up and all business in the vicinity of Borough hall was suspended for a half hour the other morning, all because a rat-tailed Missouri mule named Ebenezer objected to going down into the subway as the Borough hall opening. The mule had been working under ground in another section of the subway for a year and it was a strong protest he made against leaving the surface again.

Judges of the appellate division, Borough President Littleton and his official staff and a thousand lawyers and clerks left their work to offer advice.

In a specially constructed box stall mules are lowered by a derrick into the subway, but Ebenezer had been through one experience with that box and refused to walk in. Persuasion was useless and pushing was impossible for he was very handy with his feet, and when a street car tried to pass him let fly his heels to the consternation of the passengers.

Borough President Littleton, who had experience with mules in Texas and Tennessee, raised his window to suggest that it would be a good idea to back the mule in. But the box was not built so this could be done.

There was a strap on each side of the mule's head, and with all the men that could get their hands on the straps, it was impossible to pull him in. When he got to the entrance he would side step just enough and then the work had to be commenced all over again.

Some unnamed genius finally suggested that by putting a hawser around the mule's stern he could be warped into the box. The rope was provided, and there was no lack of volunteers. With about 75 men on each end of the rope, and all pulling together when the word was given, the mule was fairly shot into the box. Ebenezer twice tried to lunge out, but ropes were put over his back to hold him and the steam derrick lifted the box and mule and lowered them 30 feet into the subway.—New York Herald.
