OREGON, you, and each of you, are hereby
summoned to appear and answer or otherwise

or before the 14th day of July, 1906, said date be-
ing the last date of the publication hereof, and
six full weeks from and after June 2nd, 1906,
the date of the first publication hereof.
And if you fail to so appear or plead, plain-
tiff will thereafter apply to said court for the
relief demanded in her complaint to-wit: (a)
for default against you for failure to so appear
or plead; (b) for a decree in said suit that you
