WILL SEND RUSSIANS HOME

Scripps News Association Nagasaki, June 5—It is reported here upon good authority that all Russian naval prisoners, including those who surrendered voluntarily, and those captured in the recent fight, will be sent home.

TOGO VISITS ROJESTVENSKY

Tokio, June 5.—Vice Admiral Togo visited Vice Admiral Rojestvensky at the naval hospital at Sasebo Saturday, and expressed his sympathy for the admiral's wounds. He praised the desperately courageous fighting of the Russians and expressed the hope that Vice Admiral Rojestvensky would soon be able to return to Russia.

Rojestvensky was deeply moved by the admiral's words and thanked him. He congratulated Japan on the courage and patriotism of her sailors, and said it lessened his regret and sorrows of defeat to know the high character of the victors.

RUSSIAN DESTROYER PICKED UP

Shanghai, June 5.—The British steamer Kullurg has arrived here towing in a Russian destroyer which was found helpless north of Shanghai with three crews aboard.

AFTER THOSE VESSELS

London June 5.—A correspondent of the Evening News at Manila has wired that several destroyers are reported as lying inside of the Caregidor Islands.

ADMIRAL TRAIN REPORTS

Washington, June 5.—The following cablegram was received at the navy department today from Admiral Train, dated at Manila today, and was sent immediately to the president:

"Admiral Enquist states that the Aurora and the Oleg are both seriously damaged and are not seaworthy. The Jemchug is in bad condition. He makes the request to fill up with provisions and coal. Will require 14 days to repair damages. A board has been ordered to examine and report their condition. One hundred and thirty men wounded. Permission has been granted 50 to be landed.

MUST DECIDE

Washington, June 5.—Secretary of the Navy Morton today issued an order directing that the Russian ships that are now in anchor at Manila must either be interned or depart forthwith.

WILL NOT SIGN

Tokio June 5.—Rear Admiral Nebogoff is not likely to sign his parole. TENDERED RESIGNATION St. Petersburg, June 5.—M. Baullgan, the Russian minister of the Interior department, and Admiral Alexoff, who is head of the committee of affairs in the far east, tendered their resignation which the Emperor has not yet accepted.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN RIOT

Nogi's Headquarters June 5.—This morning's bulletin states that two companies of Russian cavalry were repulsed by artillery fire leaving fifteen dead on the field, later three companies were repulsed with one hundred casualties and the Russian were being pursued.

PRINCE AMONG WOUNDED

Manila, June 5.—Prince Potestau is among the wounded Russians in the hospital. Rear Admiral Enquist states that the gravest damage done to his ships was when the Japanese were firing at five-mile range.

MAY HAVE PEACE BEARING

Washington June 5.—M. Jusseland, the French ambassador called upon the President this morning and was followed by commander Fadeshta, of the Japanese naval attaché. It is presumed that he asked for information with reference to the course the United States would take regarding the Russian ships now at Manila. Ambassador Jusseland's visit is supposed to have some bearing on peace movements effecting the war in the far east.

MAY REPAIR

The President felt at least to allow the ship to be put in condition for battles. The international law allows the belligerent ships only to be repaired sufficiently to make themselves seaworthy. Had the injuries been received otherwise than in battle, a different course might have been determined upon.

Sixty Japs Captured

Scripps News Association Herbinem June 5.—The crews of five Japanese stealing vessels numbering sixty, including six Americans arrived here today. They were captured by Russian torpedo boats while approaching near Odima Island.

Headed Southwesterly

By Scripps News Association. Hong Kong June 5.—An American transport making this port today reports sighting a Russian volunteer cruiser, two torpedo boats and a cruiser transport on a course between Hong Kong and Manila. The squadron was headed in a southwesterly direction.

Must Pay \$2,000

REFUSE FURTHER | ARBITRATION

By Scripps News Association Chicago June 5.—Hops for the peaceful termination of the teamsters strike is revived here today, although nothing resulted from the conferences on Saturday and attorney Mayer asserted that his clients, the employers had declined to further consult with the strike leaders tending towards a settlement. Still it is the belief in the labor circles that the end is approaching.

Judge Grosscup today granted a stay of execution in the case of Molligan Donahue, the express teamster who was sentenced to jail by judge Kohlman for refusing to answer questions at the injunction proceedings. The men are now admitted to bail. Their cases will now be heard.

MORE ARRESTS TO FOLLOW

Attorneys for the employers this morning filed affidavits in Judge Kohlman's court alleging violation of the federal strike injunction, and asking for the arrest of twenty union teamsters, among them being Daniel Gerrigan, accused of assaulting "strike breaker" Curry. It is expected that the recent rioting will lead to the arrest of a hundred or more for contempt of court.

Albert Johnson, a former member of the teamsters union and who is now driving for Lyon & Healy, one of the largest dealers in musical goods in the United States, was waylaid while going to his work this morning and beaten into unconsciousness by five men, who it is believed were former drivers for this same firm Johnson. will probably die as a result of the injuries received.

Russian Capture

Snored In Church

To Resist Arrest

Jail Delivery

Meleor, Montreal.

Mrs. Helen Modjeska, the famous actress, who is a resident of Southern California, is at the head of the woman's reception committee, assisted by a large number of leading society women.

At Blanchard hall Tuesday evening the ceremony of conferring the third degree of the order will be held, under direction of George H. Kelly of New York.

Excursions to points of interest near by have been arranged for every day of this week. The ancient mission of San Juan Capistrano will be visited Wednesday, when Bishop Conaty will celebrate mass within the old abode walls. Another pilgrimage will be to San Fernando mission, and San Gabriel mission also will be visited. The main social event will be the banquet at Hotel Lankershim Thursday evening. It is claimed this will be the largest banquet ever spread in Los Angeles. The convention will continue throughout the week.
