rest charged with embezzlement.

The Standard Oil Co has bought
100,000 acres of gum timber land in
eastern North Carolina and will install
thereon a barrel and cask factory.

Rev Starr J Murphy for six years
has been charity manager for John D
Rockefeller drawing a handsome salary
for work done as head of the bureau
of benevolence.

Essie Bostic, a negro attempted to
enter the apartments of Mrs Sarah
Gordon a Louisville Miss., white
widow. He was arrested, but was
taken from jail and hung.

Peter L Kimberley is dead at Chic-
ago, by apoplexy. He was worth \$10-
000,000 in American mining prop-
erties and was regarded as an all round
authority on mining problems.

The United Church, Oak Park, Chi-
cago, and the Sacramento Avenue M
E church in the same place were
struck by lightning and burned June
1st. The same day the North Engle-
wood Chicago Congregational church
was also struck by lightning and
damaged.

All the Russian officers who came
alive out of the battle of the Sea of Ja-
pan, when quoted agree upon two
things: that the Japanese attack was
ferocious in its aggressive fury and
that they were greatly surprised at the
extreme readiness with which the Ja-
panese accepted surrender and the
practical and immediate kindness
shown all prisoners.

docino, enroute to San Francisco. It
contains 8,000,000 feet.

Herman Scholz, aged 30, was ac-
cidentally drowned at Aberdeen, Wash.
He was sergeant in the Philippine
war.

Women minstrels of Colfax, Wash,
gave a performance which netted \$400
which will be applied to the equip-
ment of the city park.

Joseph Patino, fireman on the steam
er Breakwater, was taken with cramps
and drowned while bathing in the
harbor at Marshfield.

Silverware valued at \$500 has been
stolen from the New York state build-
ing at the Lewis and Clark. It was
part of table service at the Fairbanks
banquet.

While plowing near Waterville Wash
Al Clarendon was knocked down and
badly burned by lightning but will
recover. Both horses were knocked
down but injured.
