This is the case in which the Amaigamated has sued Heinze for alleged extraction of ares from its Butte mines, and in which damages to the amount of \$5,500,000 are sought.

A Long Sentere

Philipsburg Mont June -Ularence Young, woodchopper who recently held up the North Coast limited on the world's list, and that of the Northern Pacific at Bearmouth, pleaded guilty yesterday and was sentenced by Judge Wilson to 50 years in the state penitentiary. Young had no money and the court appointed counsel for him. He made no defense. The court imposed the extreme penalty fixed by the last legislature. Young will be more than 80 years old should be live to serve out his sentence.
