Fearful Fall

Yosemite, Cal., June 9.—Chalres A. Bailey, a prominent resident of Berkeley, Cal., has been killed by falling from the precipice of El Capitan, a distance of 1500 feet. In company with J. G. Staats of Mount Vernon, Ohio, Bailey started up the almost perpendicular face of the cliff, a feat which has never yet been accomplished.

When they had climbed about half of the 3000 feet ascent, they halted for breath, Bailey sitting on a narrow shelf and Staats clinging to the face of the rock below. Without a word Bailey began to slide, shooting downward a few feet of Staats' left. He fell headlong out of sight, striking his head several times before he disappeared.

Men were lowered by a rope six hundred feet and brought the corpse to a point where it could be carried by a horse to the wagon road. The body was badly mangled and most of the larger bones were broken.

Principals Meet

 Washington June 9.—The two principals in the Loomis-Bowen controversy confronted each other today for the first time in the office of Secretary of War, Taft. They were brought together to listen to the testimony of Minister Russell, who was called from Bogota at the request of Bowen.
 As a result of the examination, Russell is apparently favorable to Loomis. He says that Loomis did not have any interest in the Mercando claim while it was still pending. Afterwards he accepted some bonds as security for a personal loan. Bowen asked that he be given a commission to go to Venezuela for the purpose of proving the charge that Loomis received money from the asphalt company. It is not thought that the request will be granted.

Many Indians are passing through town bound for Nepelem, where they are soon to participate in the solemn ceremony of exhuming the body of Chief Joseph, their deceased leader and laying his remains to rest in his permanent grave. These duties will be performed with all the pomp and splendor known to the red man. Joseph was one of the last chiefs of national reputation to pass to the happy hunting grounds, and it is expected that his surviving braves will make this one of the greatest events ever witnessed by the Indians in the Northwest.—Wilbur Sentinel.
