The Oregonian is so afraid that the railroads are stirring up future trouble. We wonder if the Oregonian is not more troubled because it is afraid that in case these rates are adjusted that Portland would not have the lead pipe clench it now enjoys.

"When Lewiston has railroad connection East and West, and is more firmly than ever established as a busy trade and manufacturing center, we may expect an agitation to have it placed on the same basis with Spokane for transcontinental railroad freight rates. It will naturally want to control the jobbing trade of the territory of which it is the center. Then we shall hear a great outcry from Spokane which appears now to be much disturbed by the growing importance of Lewiston and by the certain prospect that it will have adequate railroad facilities. But if Spokane gets special consideration from the railroads, why not Lewiston? Why not Colfax, Cheney, Walla Walla, Pendleton, Baker City, Boise and every other town in the interior of Oregon, Washington and Idaho? The railroads, in making an exception of Spokane, have simply stored up great future trouble for themselves."—Oregonian.

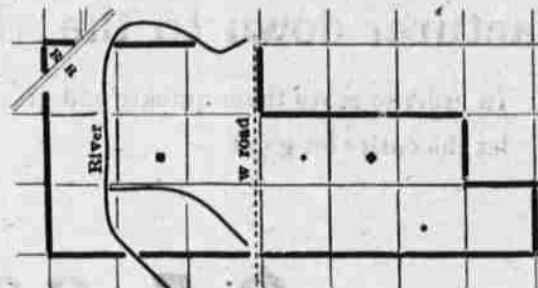

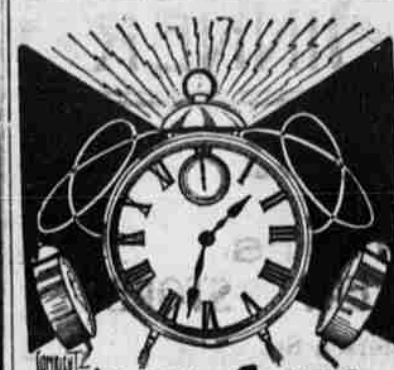
