Praise From France

Paris June 16—President Roosevelt's success in opening a way for peace negotiations between Russia and Japan is the absorbing theme here and France has forgotten her own troubles with Germany over Morocco to join in enthusiastic approval of the American initiative. Portraits of President Roosevelt, Ambassador Meyer, Minister Takahira and Ambassador Cassini appear in all the journals, with pictures of the White House as the scene of the historic foreign peace movement.

Without exception, comment on President Roosevelt's action is favorable with the exception of a slight sense of disappointment that France, as the ally of Russia, has not taken a more prominent part in effecting the preliminaries.

RAILROADS ASK FOR INJUNCTION

Kansas City June 16—Eighteen railroad today asked the Federal Court for an injunction restraining the board of railway commissioners from putting into effect the maximum freight rate law, which goes in force today. The railroads contend that the law is confiscatory. The reductions ordered average about twenty per cent. A temporary injunction will probably be granted.

**THIRTEEN OHIO
BANKERS "PENNE"**

Toledo, Ohio June 16—Cyrus M. Buras, president of the Montpelier bank, indicted by the Federal Grand Jury for embezzlement and false entries, this morning pleaded guilty to one count and was sentenced to seven years imprisonment. This now makes thirteen Ohio bankers in the penitentiary.

Envious of Cuba

Mexico City, June 16—The Canadian Mexican Steamship line will begin operations July 20, when the first steamer of the line subsidized by the Canadian and Mexican governments will sail from Montreal for Mexican ports, touching at Havana. By terms of the contract with the Mexican government boats may carry cargoes and passengers from Canada to Cuba and cargoes and passengers both ways between Mexico and Canada. The Mexican government objected to subsidizing a line that would be used to build up trade between Cuba and Canada.

Russian Strike

Rural Deliveries

On May 1, 1905, there were in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana 366 rural free delivery routes, being 93 more than there were on May 1, 1904.

Oregon had on May 1, 156 rural routes, a gain of 30 for the year. Washington on the first of May last year had 110 rural postal routes, and had on May 1 this year 154, a gain of 44 in the year.
