**OTHERS
BEFORE
THE JURY**

Chicago Ill June 21—B F Barabiel,
manager of the Kohlstaats Bakeries,
appeared before the grand jury
this morning and denied the story of
John Driscoll that Kohlstaats paid
money to labor leaders to avoid a
sympathetic strike of the teamsters
during the waiters' strike in the Kohl-
staats restaurant a year ago. He de-
clared that the strike was itself out.
The company lost \$125,000 in lost busi-
ness. Alderman Thomas Carey, a
democratic politician, told the jury
that money was given the labor lead-
ers by the party officials and was for
the purpose of securing the influence
of the leaders, and not for strike pur-
poses.

**ARE CONSIDERING
THE DISSOLUTION**

(By Scripps News Association)

Stockholm, Sweden, June 21.—When
the Riksdag assembled today in ex-
traordinary session to consider the
dissolution of the union by Norway,
the Government immediately intro-
duced a bill asking authorization to
enter into negotiations with the Nor-
wegian Storting for a conditional
settlement of the questions involved in
the separation of the heretofore dual
kingdom. Premier Ramstedt recom-
mended a pacific settlement.

THE KING SPEAKS

The Premier declared that negotia-
tion was necessary to definitely clear
up the situation. Several of the mem-
bers concurred in the premier's views.
The King addressed the assembly and
said he had acted according to his
conscience and always in conformity
with the constitution with a full desire
for the welfare of the two peoples. He
said: "The bill presented to the Rike-
dag does not aim at replying to injus-
tice by acts of coercion. Such a union
would be of little value to Sweden." The
King expressed the hope that Sweden
would regain within her own
borders what she has lost by the dis-
solution.

**SHOT IN BATTLE
WITH BURGLARS**

Chicago, June 21.—In a revolver
battle which occurred early this morn-
ing following the discovery by the
police of five burglars in a butcher
shop in the stock yards district, officer
McGeoghan was shot in the head and
will probably die. Two of the burg-
lars, John Mahoney and James O'-
Hearn, were captured, and Mahoney
was shot through the thigh. The
three escaping robbers left a trail of
blood.

**GREAT OVATION
FOR PRESIDENT**

Worcester, Mass June 21—President
Roosevelt arrived at nine twenty eight
this morning, and a committee of
citizens, headed by Governor Guild
and Mayor Blodgett, boarded the car
and welcomed the Chief Executive to
the state and to the city. The city is
gaily decorated in honor of the Presi-
dent's visit, and large crowds of re-
sidents and visitors filled the streets
to get a glimpse of the distinguished
visitor. Several companies of militia
and veterans of the civil and Spanish
war acted as an escort for the Presi-
dent to Clark University, where he
will receive the degree of L. L. D. de-
liver an address.

The run from Washington was with-
out incident and the President ate
breakfast on the train with Dr. Rixy
and secretary Loeb. At Putnam a
large crowd gathered about the station
and the President made a few remarks.
This morning he wired the captains of
the Harvard and Yale crews, who will
contest in New London next week,
saying that he wished he could see the
race, and told the Yale captain that he
was sorry he could not wish them good
luck. On the way to the college, the
President rode with Carol D. Wright,
former labor commissioner and now
head of the Clark college. President
G Stanley Hall, of the faculty, wel-
comed the President at the University.

**AGAINST PUBLIC
OWNE SHIP**

Chicago, June 21.—The Civic federa-
tion of Chicago today adopted a
special report by the executive com-
mittee advising against municipal
ownership. The report commits the
organization against either operation
or ownership of public utilities by the
city, the reason given being that the
city's operation of Chicago's water
works system has not been successful
enough to warrant a belief that the city
could successfully operate a street car
system or other public utilities.

Bank Ordered Closed

Philadelphia, June 21.—The state
bank examiners have ordered the City
Trust, Safe deposit and Surety com-
pany to close its doors, and A H Taber
has been appointed receiver. The
concern had a capital of half a million
and its deposits are estimated at two
million five hundred thousand dollars.
