AUGUST PEACE MEETING

By Scripps News Association Washington June 26—The following statement was issued from the White House this afternoon: "The President has received from both Russia and Japan a statement that the plenipotentiaries of the two countries would meet in the United States during the first ten days in August..."

JEWISH QUARTER IN FULL REVOLT

(By Scripps News Association) St Petersburg June 26—A message from Warsaw says that the Jewish quarter is now in full revolt, and it is expected that a repetition of the massacre at Lodz will occur in the Polish capital.

RIOTERS ATTACK GENERAL'S PALACE

(By Scripps News Association) Kovno, Russian Poland, June 26.—A mob of a thousand surrounded and attacked the police station and the Governor General's palace today and broke all the windows. Five policemen were wounded, but the dragons dispersed the rioters.

MORE DRIVERS TO GO ON STRIKE

Rebels Defeat Germans

Five Men Killed

(By Scripps News Association) New York, June 26—Five men were buried in an apartment house on West 180th Street, which collapsed during a storm this afternoon. The firemen and police are at the work of rescue.

TWENTY CADETS DROWNED

By Scripps News Association Copenhagen Denmark June 26—The private cadet ship "Georgestage" was rammed today by the British steamer "Ancona" and sunk. Twenty of the cadets aboard were drowned. The "Georgestage" sank in one and one-half minutes after the collision.

WILL PROSECUTE REBATE CASES
