SENTENCED

WEDNESDAY

Since the conviction of Roy Miller, who was formerly a resident of this city, there has been considerable inquiry, as to more or less of the details and we give the following clipping from the Baker City Herald.

"Miller negotiated for the purchase of Goss' bank. The price agreed upon was \$15,000. Of this amount \$1000 was to go to Goss and the remaining \$14,000, in cash, was to go to the bank's assets, there being at that time about \$12,000 in deposits in the bank and several outstanding notes and other obligations which this \$14,000 was to cover making the bank entirely solvent. The deal was consummated and Miller as cashier of the First National bank, wrote his individual check for \$15,000, payable to A. P. Goss, and as cashier of that same bank certified to it. This check he took to the Bank of Sumpter and the change of ownership occurred about as follows:

Goss stepped out in front of the counter. Miller gave him the \$15,000 check and stepped behind the counter. Goss presented the check for payment and Miller opened a book and entered an item of \$1000 thereon to Goss' credit, which later Goss wrote checks upon. The bank was then Miller's. What he did with the \$15,000 check is not known. It was shown at the trial that the \$1000 which he paid to Goss was money belonging to depositors and in the bank at the time Goss stepped out. While the evidence did not say so in as many words, yet it seemed an undisputed conclusion that Miller never put a cent of money into the vaults.

That this check on the First National bank was worthless was one of the facts which the jury had to decide before they could find Miller guilty and as they found him guilty it is undisputed that the check was absolutely worthless and that Miller knew it at the time of giving it. The check never showed up after Goss passed it over the counter. Since the appointment of a receiver it has been shown that for while the balance of the check, \$14,000 was carried as an asset of the bank, but about the first of the year this entry was wiped off the books and changed to bank building and real estate and that is the last trace of it.

When the bank finally closed its doors instead of the \$14,000 assets and \$12,000 depositors' money supposed to be in the vault obtainable in notes and other securities, there was \$45. This is the history of the famous deal and it is more than probable that the supreme court of the state of Oregon will be asked to pass upon it.

Miller will appear in court Wednesday when he will be sentenced, and it is probable that at the same time a motion for a new trial will be urged by the defense and a stay granted. The penalty for the crime of which Miller now stands convicted is from one to five years in the penitentiary."
