Mrs Charles Baker left this morning for a visit to relatives and friends at Union.

The side walk is being removed in front of the Foley House and a new cement side walk will soon be completed all along that side of the block.

The Electric Light and power company is busy at work putting in a number of new poles throughout the city.

W K Davis is now the sole proprietor of the La Grande Knitting works in this city and will move into the Haworth building next to jeweler Hewitt. Mr Davis has been with the company as manager since the factory started and thoroughly understands the business which is steadily growing. Agencies are established in all of the leading cities in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, and the products of the factory give the best of satisfaction.

Mr J A Chandler presented the Observer with several samples of strawberries grown on his farm just across the river which are just as beautiful as Grande Ronde strawberries can be. Mr Chandler has an acre in berries and expects to add four acres more next season. He has contracted his present crop at \$1.50 per crate, which after paying 20cents for the crate and thirty cents for picking leaves \$1 net for his berries, and as this season he will have at least 200 crates his profit will be \$150 for the acre. This season has been far from an average berry season. Ordinarily he would have harvested 400 crates from this same tract. Mr Chandler pumped water for irrigation purposes from the river with a gasoline engine which he finds highly satisfactory.
