## State Politics

Senator E. M. Croisan of Marion county, who spent yesterday in Pendleton, in an interview said that Marion county has two candidates for secretary of state to succeed F. T. Dunbar, who has held this lucrative position for nearly eight years. The new seekers for the honors and the emolument (?) of this desirable state office are Frank Wrightman and Claude Gatch. Wrightman was formerly sheriff of Marion county and is now clerk of the corporation department, of the secretary of state's office, a position created by the corporation law in 1902. Claude Gatch is one of the most prominent citizens of Salem and aspired to the seat in congress now held by Binger Hermann.

Both men are avowed candidates and will make the contest warm in Marion county as well as in other counties. "Have you any other candidates for state offices?" was asked Senator Croisan. "Well, yes, there is Geer." "And what does he want?" "Two months ago I talked to him and he said that he would be a candidate before the direct primaries for either United States senator or governor of Oregon. There is no doubt that he will be a candidate for one or the other, probably governor." "How do the people of Marion county feel about the direct primary law?" "They are very strong for its enforcement, in letter and spirit. They do not approve of a state convention and they are also afraid of a state convention; even a state convention to draw up a platform, lest it go beyond its original intentions. The people of Marion county believe in giving the direct primary law a fair trial, at least."

Senator Croisan supported T. T. Geer for United States senator in 1900 when C. W. Fulton was elected. He was also the author of a direct primary bill similar to the one that became a law. In an interview the other day obtained by the Tribunes from Senator Fulton, the direct primary law was supported by Senator Fulton, who said that he believed that United States senators should be nominated in direct primaries and elected at the regular election, and that their election should be endorsed by the legislature just as the electoral college endorses the election of the president.—Pendleton Tribunes.
