BANK'S ASSETS EXCEED LIABILITIES

(Scripps News Association)
Topeka, Kan July 3.—The assets of the First National Bank of Topeka, which closed its doors today on account of alleged speculations on the part of Mr Devlin, one of the stockholders, on later information, is estimated at seven million dollars and the liabilities at two million dollars. The interests of Mr Devlin in the Topeka banks are said to be a million dollars and he owns eleven coal companies.

BRADLY APPOINTED
Washington July 3.—The comptroller of currency has appointed National bank examiner James Bradley as temporary receiver of the First National Bank of Topeka.

Mr Devlin's attorney announces that he owes the First National Bank a million dollars, the Kansas City bank four hundred thousand dollars, the New York banks a quarter of a million, the Chicago banks one hundred and fifty thousand dollars and the St Louis banks a quarter of a million.

Following the announcement of the failure of the First National bank, a run started on the Central National Bank in which Delvin was also a stockholder, and on other banks in which Delvin held stock, and many deposits have been withdrawn. It is announced that Delvin has turned over to the banks real estate and securities worth seven hundred thousand dollars and insurance policies to the amount of six hundred and sixty seven thousand dollars.

Packers Give Bail

Chicago July 3.—The Chicago attorneys for the packers and employees indicted by the Federal Grand Jury Saturday for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws, appeared before Judge Bethel this afternoon and gave bonds of five thousand dollars each. The trial of the cases will be set for the fall term of the court.
