LA GRANDE LEADS

After an absence of ten days from La Grande during which, not counting the miles we rode on street cars in Seattle and Portland and a yacht ride of several hours on Puget Sound, we traveled over 1200 miles in getting to and back home from Portland, Oregon City, McMinnville and Seattle and are glad to get back to La Grande.

In this hurried whirl through numerous towns, of about the size of La Grande, and all older we saw therein no public drinking fountain for man and beast. This made us recall that La Grande is indebted for this distinction and evidence of benevolence and enterprise to the ladies thereof. In the art galleries of the Lewis and Clark Fair we gazed upon monuments intended to immortalize warriors, that recall stories of desolated provinces, pillaged cities and trails "that lead through slaughter to a throne; or the busts of statesmen, who planned for power over their fellow men that they might luxuriously abide in palaces, and assume the right; because of their superior cunning, to parcel out all the conveniences and comforts of life to those, and those only who bowed their knees and pledged their every effort to sustain their leige lords in power under instructions that "any means were justifiable," frauds, deceit per jury and slander and slaughter.

The monument to the women of La Grande recalls no such memories of misery and degradation. Standing as it does in a village street, the train of thoughts which it inspires is loftier and far more ennobling than any of the works of the ancient artists or classical painters for it encourages an ambition in those who wish to be known in the future for doing good to their fellow man and not evil, enlarge the circle of his enjoyment and not curtail it. Unless the signs of the times are misleading and the promise of Christ misunderstood, the time is hastening, and the present century will not close without its arrival, when humanity will weave its most beautiful garlands of remembrance for the adornment of the monuments of those who have planned and worked out the most good and did the most to increase the dignity of man and to enlarge the comforts of the masses. And in that halcyon age those who provide "a cup of cold water" will have wreaths of immortalities placed upon their monuments of far more brilliancy than has ever graced the statues of warriors or selfish statesmen. In that glad day of the recognition of the workers for human happiness the ladies of La Grande will be remembered as greater than Caesar and more worthy of honorable remembrance than pompous officials for is it not written in the Holy Book, "Verily I say they shall in no wise lose their reward" for giving a cup of water.

It is a safe prediction that the next United States senator from this state will be elected by the people.
