Council Meeting

Last night was one of the warmest of the warmest of the season. Nevertheless the city council held a mid-night session and then adjourned to meet again next Wednesday night to finish several matters carried over.

Two ordinances were passed, one empowering the street committee to contract with some one to sprinkle such streets as they thought advisable. The other was the passage of a bicycle ordinance which permits, (if it becomes a law) the use of the sidewalks except within the fire limits, under the stated restrictions. The ordinance will be published in the Observer as soon as the mayor signs it.

Chas. G. Bunte asked for a permit to repair the building recently destroyed by fire, and make a one story business house out of it. The petition was denied and the mayor ordered the marshal to order Mr. Bunte to remove the remaining portion of the building.

The council instructed the recorder to purchase a typewriter for the recorders office.

Mayor Slater asked what disposition the committee had made with his suggestion that they take steps to recover on the bonds of J. L. Christain. The chairman of the committee being absent no report was handed in.

The treasurers report shows that warrants to the amount of \$3000 had been paid off during the month which included warrants issued up to eighteen months ago. This is the best financial showing the city has made for several years.

The marshalls report showed that nine arrests had been made during the past month, and sixteen head of stock had been impounded.

The recorders books for the month of June show the receipts of the water system amounted to \$1070.70, the largest in the history of the city.

The warm weather showed its effect along about midnight when the mayor closed the council, the officers and everybody in general. S. A. Gardiner also took a hand and raked the officers and after the council adjourned it was a free for all pitch in, and boquets were handed back and forth with lightening rapidity. All felt better and no damage was done and possibly the city received, or may receive some benefit.

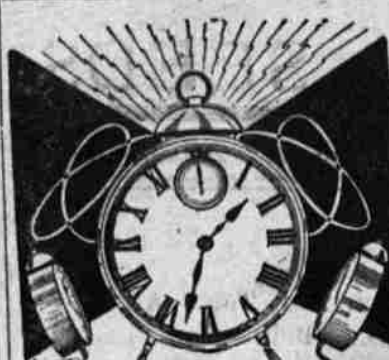
