Events of a most humiliating nature have hastened the time for the people of Oregon to begin to think about making selections of one Senator to represent the state in the United States Senate and two members of the House of Representatives. The Initiative and Referendum recently adopted in this state and the late law regulating primary elections, while they give the private citizen far more power and influence in public affairs than heretofore, they also correspondingly, increase the personal responsibility of each voter.

The private voter in Ore; on can no longer shirk the responsibility of a full share in the management of public affairs or in the selectson of proper persons to represent the state in the council of the nation. When a bad man is selected to represent Oregon in the Senate of the United States of House of Representatives the voter can not now skulk be sind that mysterious and consiousless "they" and say they did it: and if shame is cast upon the fair name of the state, an the finger of scorn is pointed at Oregon and Oregonians because of the bad acts of our represe tatives in the council chambers of the nation, or if our state does not grow in population, wealth, and all the facilities for comfortable living as fast as our neighboring state do because of bid laws or unwise policies, each voter must take his full share of the opprotium and reproach "They and you" have been eliminated from the vocabulary of free men, it is now "I and we" We must now use prothinking of what has been done in public matters or in what it is proposed to do. Fully comprehending the personal responsibility that wis now placed on each of us as voters in a free country let each freeman give to the nation and state his best thoughts and most manly action so that each can stand in the vigerous dignity of full grown manhood and look the world in its face with unblanching eye and say "I did my full duty, as I saw i', to my country and state But let each remember th t with the great power now possessed by each voter in Oregon the outside world will judge bim by the men he chooses and the laws that we make.

Do not forget to attend the good roads meeting which will be held in this city next Tuesday. The matter of roads is one of special importance to every citizen of this county, and the meeting here should receive careful attention.

The report of the U S Department of Agriculture, Oregon Section dated July 5, 1905 from Portland gives the general outlook of crops in this state as good Fall sown wheat is filling nicely. Spring wheat in the Wilfamettee valley is infested with fungus diseases and insect pests more than usual, otherwise its conditio . is promising. Red rust is damaging the oat crop some and lice are bothering the hops. Throughout the state the outlook is good especially for hay and fall wheat, corn, gardens, pota oes, field onions and angar beets continue doing well.
