Another Victim

Vancouver, Wash., July 6.—Ophelia, the six-year-old child of George M. Weigle, a prominent business man of this city, was fatally injured last night by the discharge of a pistol or other explosive. The child, accompanied by a relative, was standing in the crowd on Main street, when she suddenly fell to the pavement with a cry of pain. When taken to a physician she was found to be bleeding profusely from a wound in the back of her head and her skull fractured. The child died during the night. So far the police have been unable to discover the identity of the person who caused the child's death.

Narrow Escape

Canyon City, July 7.—Just as we were going to press word reached the office that Ray, the 10-year-old son of J. T. Berry, had a very narrow escape from burning to death.

While playing with fire crackers with two other little boys in the orchard back of Mr. Berry's house, fire in some way fell into his pocket and ignited a bunch of fire crackers which exploded before he could get them out. His clothes were set on fire and he was frightfully burned about the stomach and upper part of the legs.

The doctors state that the burns are not very deep and that the little fellow will undoubtedly recover. At the time of the accident Mr. Berry was at the celebration grounds, conducting a stand.—Grant County News.

Reno Nev July 7.—Jim Jeffries, former heavyweight champion of the world, spent a few hours in this city after releasing the Hart-Root fight by bucking games in one of the largest gambling houses in the city. His play ran high and reports has it that he lost in the neighborhood of \$5700. He made bets ranging from \$50 to several hundred dollars, and before he had been playing an hour he was the centre of attraction, and sports from all the gambling houses in the city crowded the gambling parlors to watch the big man play his money. Jeffries placed his wagers with a light spirit, and when several hundred dollars was raked in by the dealer he would laugh and double the bet. He is known to have drawn a check for several thousand dollars.

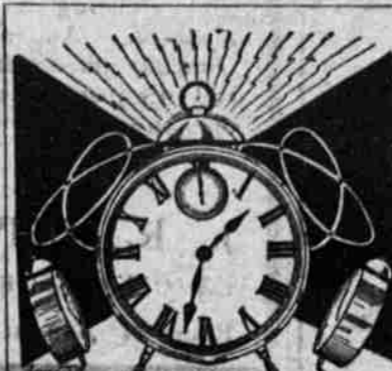
