LAWSON MAKES SPEECH

Lawson said in part that two factors were inevitable in robbery, namely, the robber and the robbed. All robbers become honest men or convicts when either party refuses to participate. In the early days of our nation these were robbers, but the victims did not react meekly under their wrongs. The system of today is bolder, bolder and more grasping than that which our ancestors drove across the ocean in seventy six. It has possessed itself of resources in our rich country and levies a tribute on our coal, iron, meat, bread and clothes.

It has a tax on every motion and function of our lives. Mr Lawson then explained the workings of the system and said that the big financiers grew more insolent every day, flaunting their riches and superiority before the law and in the face of the people. As a remedy he said that municipal ownership was a mere will o' the wisp. He stated that the financiers asked nothing better than the advocated "system". He said that the first step was to sell every share of stock and every bond to the federal government, at the present inflated price and to invest the money in Government, state and municipal bonds. This act, he said would lay a foundation for the collapse of "the System".

Chose Sudden Death

Roseburg Ore. July 8—Pinned by one leg by the roots of a big stump which had fallen on him while digging a ditch, the body of Eli Miller, an aged miner, was found yesterday at his mine, the Headquarters, 13 miles from Myrtle Creek. The body was discovered by Green Hearn, a neighbor. Beside it was Miller's hound, which had almost starved while guarding the body. Circumstances indicate that the accident happened June 24. Miller had freed one leg by hacking at the stump with a grub hoe.

When found the body was in an advanced state of decomposition and the flesh of the throat had wasted away entirely. This latter condition was explained by an open clasp knife covered with blood stains lying near the body. Unable to free himself from the roots of the stump, which had crushed one leg into a jelly, and despairing of ever getting help in that isolated place, Miller deliberately cut his throat in preference to dying a slow death from starvation, a death that would have been made doubly frightful by intense pain from his pinned leg.

Lone Highwayman

Weiser, July 8.—The stage from Warren to Meadows was held up and robbed about 8:30 yesterday morning about three miles from Restort station by a lone highwayman who, at the point of a gun, made the driver of the stage cut open the mail sack, from which the robber took all the registered letters. The stage contained two passengers and the driver, who were lined up by the highwayman and compelled to give up their money and valuables. He was a stranger to the driver and passengers. He was unmasked and made no effort to conceal his face. After finishing his business the robber with perfect nonchalance walked off in the direction of Warren. He did his work with the ease of a professional.

It is not known the amount the robber secured, but considerable money is carried over the route, as nearly all the Thunder Mountain mail is carried by this stage. The postal authorities have been notified and a vigorous search will be instituted for the bold robber.
