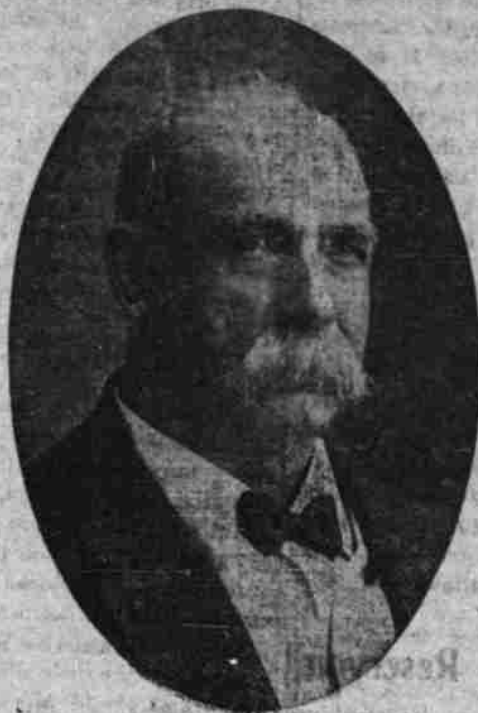

Good Roads Convention Opens Tomorrow

This morning there arrived in this
city a delegation of men and women,
who if the people of this valley will al-
low them, will do more to make Un-
ion county world famous, and rural
life worth living, than any other com-
bination of men yet to visit this coast.
These gentlemen are the officers of the
National Good Roads Association, and
it is their mission to look over our
county roads and the surrounding re-
sources as concerns road building, and
instruct us in the art of good road
making. It is a self-evident fact that
we in the west, and especially in this
county, require instruction in the ap-
parently lost art.

The good road party arrived this
morning on passenger train No. 6, and
their special car was at the depot by a
representative committee of the La Grande
Commercial Club who extended to
them a hearty welcome, and escorted
them to breakfast. After breakfast,
some of the delegates accompanied by
a committee of the club took the train
for Elgin where meetings will be held
today and another committee escorted
others of the party through the valley
in carriages. The entire party will
assemble here this evening when an
informal reception will be tendered
them at the Commercial Club parlors.
As there are a number of ladies in the
Good Roads party, it is desirable that
as many of the La Grande ladies at-
tend the reception as possible. To-
morrow morning at ten o'clock the
meeting will be formally opened at the
court house, and it is proper to state
that every citizen of this county and

city is invited to attend this and all
other meetings of the association. In
the afternoon at two o'clock there will
be another meeting at the same place
and yet another meeting in the even-
ing. It is hoped that all three of these
meetings will be well attended. La
Grande is indeed honored by the pres-
ence of these gentlemen, and the re-
sults of their visit, if we do our part,
will be almost beyond the power of
man to estimate. As will be seen by

ledge exposed for a considerable dis-
tance. The ledge is shown to be fifty
feet wide and the tunnel is in nearly
a hundred feet. The rock is of a
value which assures a real tonnage as
soon as a mill can be placed on the
property.

Notice To Water Consumers

All persons knowing themselves to
be in arrears for city water are her-
by notified to call at the office of the
city Recorder and settle at once. In
order that there may be no miss under-
standing we cite the customer to the
following section of the city
ordinance. This ordinance will be in-
forced.

Section 28—The water rates shall be
payable in advance at the office of
the water superintendent on the first
day of each month (except for meters
which are payable on the first day
of the succeeding month), and if not
paid within the first ten days the
water will be shut off the premises, as
provided in Sections 26 and 27.
Later ordinance provides that water
rates shall be payable to City Recorder
or instead of Water Superintendent.

tween 2nd and Greenwood streets, are
hereby notified that the water will be
shut off tomorrow, July 11, between
the hours of 2 and 4 p m on account of
