MONEY IN U. S.

The Circulation statement issued by the U S Treasury Department, July 1, 1905, received from our farms product valued bp the Observer Monday July at \$873,322,882 or more than 10, gives the general stock of all three times as much as in 1860 kinds of United Stases money on July 1, at \$2,885,079,229, being an increase since June 1 of \$15,732,646.

1905 consisted of gold coin, including bulletin in US Treasury, \$1,352,063 028, silver coins \$672,991,620, Treasury Notes of 1890 \$9,413,000, U S Notes, Greenbacks \$346,681,016 and National Bank Notes \$495,719. 806, It will be seen from the above that much the larger portion of the money with which the people of the United States are now doing business is gold and silver.

Of the money in stock \$288, 362,758 were held in the US Treasury as assets of the Government which being deducted from the general stock of money in the US on July 1, leaves \$2,596,716,471 on that date in circulation the same being \$75, 564,944 more than was in circulation on July 1, 1904 and \$1,780,449,750 more dollars than were in circulation on Jan. 1. 1879 and \$2,148,311,704 more than were in circulation in 1861 at the close of Buchannan's Administration.

To refute cynical dogma that no cheerful ideas can be expressed in figures, the tollowing extracts are taken from a page of government reports

In 1800 the circulation per capita in the US was \$5. In 1850 it was \$1202. In 1861 when the Republican party took control of the nation the per capita of money in circulation in the United States was \$13.93 and on July 1, 1905 the per capita was \$31.19. In 1860 with a per capita of money in circulation of 12 85 the imports of merchandise amounted to a per capita of \$11.25 and the exports were \$10.61 per capita or 64 cents per capita less than the exports. In 1903 we imported a per capita of foreign goods for consumption at home of \$12.54 and for the same year we exported of things grown or manufactured in the United States amounting to a per capita of \$17 32 showing that our exports that year exceeded our imports by a per capita of

Of this \$256,550,972 worth was agricultural products being 81.13 per cent of our total domestic exports, \$40,345, 892 worth of things made in our manufactures, the same being 12.16 per cent of our demestic exports, 63 per cept of our total domestic exports was the products of our mines. The product of our forests exported in 1860 amounted to 3.26 per cent of our exports. Now compare these figures with those that measure our domestic exports in 1903 and see if you co not have a pleasant picture of home life in our country. In 1903 our total exports of domestic merchandise was of the value of \$1,392,281,302 or more than four times greater than in 1860 In 1903 we exported but in 1860 the farms furnished 81.18 per cent of our domestic exports and in 1903 but 62.73 per cent. 
