May All Be Dead

Cardiff, Wales July 11—An explosion occurred today in the United National Colliery, where one hundred and eighty miners were at work. It is feared that all were killed.

This afternoon six dead bodies were taken from the mine including that of the mine manager.

ALL HOPES LOST

Cardiff, Wales, 3 P. M. All hope of saving the entombed miners has now been abandoned. The dead will reach 141. Eight bodies have been recovered all badly burned.

REPORT AWFUL CRIME

City of Mexico July 11—One of the most horrible tragedies ever enacted in a bull ring in Mexico is reported from the city of Durango.

A drunken spectator, who was responsible for the last bull of an exhibition goring Silverio Chico, a famous matador, was literally torn to pieces by a mob. His head was hacked from his body, his heart taken out and stamped upon, and the trunk and limbs cut and torn into small bits.

The sixth and last bull of the exhibition proved to be very large and fierce, and the cleverness of the matador in "playing" the animal gained him fresh applause. Just as he lunged forward, his sword penetrating the heart of the animal, a drunken spectator hurled a piece of iron pipe. The pipe struck the matador on the head, and he fell senseless in front of the bull. The enraged animal succeeded in goring him six times before he fell over dead.

As soon as the people realized what had happened there was a rush for the drunken offender. He was thrown into the ring and there torn to pieces.

Asks Representation

Washington July 11—China's request to be represented in the Washington conference, on the ground that she is vitally interested in its proceedings, has been received by the President and informally transmitted to the belligerents. Whether the President has received the formal replies can not be learned, but it can be stated that while Russia is inclined to favor the suggestion Japan will not consent to it.

Japan has already made public her assurance that Manchuria is to be restored to China. That is one of the principles for which she says she has been fighting. Japan regards herself as fully capable of executing this promise without the assistance of China, and in view of China's inability before the war to cope with Russia in Manchuria, the Japanese government is unable to see what possible service a Chinese representative would be in a Washington conference.

COWBOYS SHOT FROM THE CARS

Wheeling W Va July 11—Telephone messages early this morning from Clarksburg and Durnhulle, W. Va. tell of a battle between excursionists from Clarksburg on a Baltimore & Ohio train and Cowboys, members of a wild west show. One of the cowboys was ejected from the excursion train and his comrades came to his rescue and opened a fusillade on the train. The fire was returned and Joe Johnson, proprietor of the show, and Mexican George, a cowboy, were killed. Several excursionists were shot and seriously wounded by the cowboys.

Sisters Drowned

Idaho Falls Idaho July 11—Two daughters of John Hjemquist aged 15 and 20 years, have been drowned while bathing in the Idaho canal. It is believed that one of the girls stepped into a hole and the other tried to rescue her. Both attended school at Weiser, and were at home for the vacation period.

KILLED WITH HIS QUEUE

San Francisco, July 10.—Strangled to death with his own queue, the body of Lin Moon Chuck, a Chinese physician, was found lying in the entrance of a squalid Chinese house in Chinatown today. It is supposed that he was decoyed to that place by a satiation call to attend a sick person and then killed and robbed. He was known to carry considerable money, and also had some valuable diamonds and jewelry.

STILL TAKING THE TESTIMONY
