After the Jews

JAPAN
REFUSES

LAWSON WILL SUE
INSURANCE CO'S

Omaha Neb. July 12.—In an interview aboard his private car this morning, Thomas Lawson said that he would soon take the first steps against the insurance companies in the form of a law suit, in which he would be aimed at the New York Life, Equitable and Mutual Life. In short he said:—"The suit will be for the restitution of millions illegally received by the companies in the shape of commissions and perquisites, and the results will be that the people will recover their money." The indications are that the fight will be a nasty one, but will show that the charges I make are mild in comparison with the facts." Mr. Lawson said that over fourteen thousand policy holders joined in agreeing to the request to be parties to the suit.

Des Moines July 12 (2:30)—Lawson spoke at Missouri Valley Chautauque today. Governor Cummings failed to welcome him.

Sioux City, Ia., July 12, 2:30 p.m.—The Lawson train stopped here long enough to permit him to say "When I have finished the fight on the system of freight and passenger rates, lowered prices on meat and food stuffs will be cut and the American man can again start a bank account. Thousands upon thousands have assured me they will sell securities when I tell them to do so. Thus will I put Rockefeller in to the receiver's hand. Only death can save him."

Idaho Land Frauds

Scott visited the stock yards and a number of railroad offices, where a renewed request was made for a record train to New York. None of the railroads seem to favor the project. The miner not verifying the reports of his fabulous tips as to his easy financial manner, consequently his stock is on the decline in the windy city.

Confesses Murder

The men, according to Graham, quarreled and in the heat of passion Graham fired three bullets into Quinn's breast, in self defense. The murder occurred last January.
