London, July 12 .- The Morning Post from authorative sources, gives an account of the recent outbreak at Libau. The attempt to carry out the sentences of death provoked still more serious signs of mutiny, whereupon the port commander ordered the executions stopped and applied to St. Petersburg for instructions.

The government replied that all the mutineers must be shot and a shooting party was formed, but when the order to fire was given the firing squad turned and fired on the officers instead of on the condemned mutineers, and a dozen officers fell dead. Other troops, including Cossacks, the account says, were summoned, and a serious conflict. ensued, during which 23 Cossacks were killed before the mutiny was quelled
