**MAN HUNT  
IN KANSAS**

Loia, Kas., July 13.—Two hundred armed men under the direction of Sheriff Richardson have started a search of the country around about Loia for C. L. Melvin, the temperance fanatic, who has been in hiding since the destruction of the three Loia saloons by dynamite, and who is believed still to have in his possession a great quantity of dynamite with which he has threatened to cause further destruction. Many citizens have joined in the chase which soon developed into an exciting man-hunt.

**To Extradite**

Olympia, Wash., July 13.—Governor Mead will tomorrow grant the requisition of Governor Johnson of Minnesota for Mrs. Ida M. Johnson, whose case has been complicated by the strained relations between the two governors, because of Governor Johnson's refusal to grant the requisition for Hesse M. Allen, the school mistress wanted in this state for murder.

Governor Mead will address a letter to Governor Johnson in connection with the Mrs. Johnson requisition, in which it is promised he will go into details of the Allen requisition matter.

At the hearing this afternoon Will H. Morris appeared for Mrs. Johnson and contended that the indictment presented was not sufficient evidence to prove she was a fugitive from justice.

**Gas Bill of Suicide**

Portland, Oregon, July 13.—With an exceptionally keen eye to business, Mrs. E. Newcomb, landlady where J. W. Halgarth, aged 28 years, a rancher with property near Walla, Ore., committed suicide Sunday night by turning on the gas, seized 45 cents, all the money the dead man possessed, and held it in payment for the gas used by him in killing himself. The cause of the suicide is not known.

Mrs. Newcomb, before the arrival of the police and of Coroner Finley, searched the dead man's belongings. All he had was 45 cents. This Mrs. Newcomb took, saying she would hold it in payment for the gas wasted in taking his life. Coroner Finley considered the act of the woman with a grant, and without any comment allowed her to keep the money.

**Crops and Weather**

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the week ending Monday July 11.

**GENERAL SUMMARY**

The past week was dry and the hottest of the season. These conditions were very favorable for haying, and this work has been pushed along rapidly. The hay crop promises to be heavier than last year, although some few localities it is not so good as expected. Pasturage is getting short, and consequently the milk supply in the dairy districts is decreasing.

The harvest of barley and fall rye has begun, and fall wheat cutting will become general next week. Fall wheat is maturing nicely, but it has been a little too warm for spring wheat, especially the late sown. Oats show considerable improvement. Corn and gardens have made good advancement. Hop lice are still plentiful in many yards, and considerable spraying has been done during the week. The grain aphid is disappearing, and reports as to the amount of damage caused by this pest are conflicting.

Apples, pears, peaches and prunes, although below average in quantity, are doing nicely. The berry season in the western section is drawing to a close, but in the higher elevations in eastern Oregon it is now at its height.

**PLATEAU REGION**

La Grande Union county W. F. Gekeler—Week ideal for haying; timothy not quite ready to cut; hay on bottoms that depends on the overflow is almost a failure; very little grain will be made into hay; grain of all kinds is growing well.

Haines, Baker county, J. K. Fisher—Weather favorable; irrigating done and plenty of water for the first crop of clover and alfalfa, which is being cut rapidly; vegetables of all kinds doing well; strawberries being picked; dairy products falling off somewhat.

Joseph, Walla county, W. H. Robins—Weather warm and dry; all crops look fine; will begin to cut alfalfa this week; sheep shearing nearly completed; pastures continue good; barley is heading out.

Pine Creek, Lake county, A. M. Smith—Weather warm and dry; rain needed to make wheat and late barley fill; early barley ripening; haying becoming general, with light yield; strawberries a light crop, but plenty of other berries; all garden products doing well; water supply failing fast.
