Sheriff \$21,000 Short

Pendleton, July 14.—Experts going over the books in the sheriff's office have found the accounts \$21,000 short and the examination is not yet completed. Present indications are that the shortage will amount to \$40,000 or \$50,000.

As soon as it became known that there was a shortage, the democratic friends of Sheriff T. D. Taylor commenced digging up and up to noon today had pledged themselves to the sum of \$12,000, but as the shortage is continually growing larger, it is feared they will not be able to meet it.

T. D. Taylor is sheriff and this is his second term. He was re-elected last fall by an overwhelming majority. It is said that Taylor himself is innocent of any wrong, but that the crime lies between his deputies, G. P. Davis and Roy Funk. No direct charges have yet been brought against either.

Under Fraud Order

St. Louis July 13.—A temporary restraining order was issued today by Judge Smith McPherson of Iowa, sitting in the United States district court, against Postmaster Frank Wyman, requiring him to discontinue stamping the mail of the People's United States bank and E. G. Lewis as fraudulent and returning it to the sender. In the meantime mail will not be delivered to the bank or to Lewis, but will be held at the St. Louis postoffice pending final action.

General News

Twenty seven deaths from heat have occurred in Pittsburg, during the month of July.

Robert W. Brown, of Louisville Ky., was elected grand exalted ruler of the grand lodge of Elks at Buffalo, Wednesday.

It is said there are sufficient funds in the fraudulent Peoples' United States bank at St. Louis to pay all depositors in full.

Three unknown persons occupying a pleasure yacht in New York harbor, were run down by a Swedish steamer and drowned Wednesday morning.

Under a new adjustment of representation in parliament, Ireland will lose 22 members, which is causing a terrible fight from the Irish member.

All the railroad bridges on the Salt and New rivers in New Mexico are washed away by floods. Many settlements have been flooded but no lives lost.

Because of Depew's connection with the Equitable swindles, Yale college men are demanding that he resign from the office of that institution.

The coroner's jury in Salt Lake City has declared that Mrs. Edward H. Mitchell who died mysteriously there several days ago was murdered by her husband before he suicided, because she contemplated securing a divorce.

Chicago express companies have organized a new corporation for the avowed purpose of dodging the federal injunction prohibiting them from delivering goods to boycotted houses during the teamsters' strike.

The Fourth of July attendance at the Lewis and Clark Exposition was 53,708. This is at least 30 percent more than the most sanguine of the officials expected. It beats the Fourth of July attendance at the Omaha exposition by nearly 10,000, and is 14, 131 higher than the attendance on the opening day at Portland, June 1. Up to July 4, half a million admissions had been recorded in the thirty-four days at the big fair. The aggregate is far above expectations. The attendance is increasing daily, and all indications point to a total that will break every exposition record, considering the neighboring population. The fair will run until October 15.

Northwest News

Fifty seven mountain climbers reached the summit of Mt. Hood Wednesday.

E. P. Greoz, police judge of Carvallis has skipped out, being short in his accounts about \$600.

The number of prisoners in the Washington penitentiary for the past month was 744, an increase of 17 over last year.

A 25 cent night admission was decided upon by the management of the Lewis and Clark fair management Wednesday.

The National Congress of Methodists was formally opened in Portland Wednesday with a large attendance from every state in the Union.

During the arrest of Chinese gamblers in New Westminster, B. C., Tuesday night, about 50 Chinese assaulted the police and a general riot followed.
