GREAT RUSH FOR INDIAN LANDS

Seattle July 14—The greatest land office rush ever experienced here occurred today when 400 men were lined up at 9 o'clock to make filing on the newly opened government land near the Quinalt Indian reservation 50 miles north of Hoquiam. Within an hour 300 entries were made on the 250 available timber and homestead claims. This land is valuable and some time numbers of settlers, have been living on it without filing. These and scores of others got in line two hours before the land office opened so far as to be able to enter their papers by one other claimants. There were many duplicate filings made, but no trouble was experienced in handling the crowd.

BIG MILL FOR HOOD RIVER

Hood River Or July 14—Hood River is considering a proposal for a \$1,000,000 cotton mill. E. W. Tarr, of Boston accompanied by Dr. A. LeRoy, superintendent of the information department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, was here last night and presented his plans to an open meeting of the Hood River Commercial Club. It is asked that Hood River business men furnish a 25-acre site, free water power and subscribe a portion of the stock. It is expected that the greater part of the stock will be taken in Portland. A committee of the Commercial Club has been appointed to inquire further into the matter and see if the necessary site and power can be secured at a reasonable figure.

Strict Orders

Olympia Wash July 14—A letter to the attorney general from Superintendent Charles Buchanan of the Tualip Indian agency reveals that the commissioner of the Indian affairs has instructed all Indian agents in this state to see that the law making it a misdemeanor to sell or give intoxicants to Indians is strictly enforced.

The occasion for the order is the recent decision of the federal courts to the effect that an "allotted" Indian is not a ward of the government but a citizen of the state in which he resides, and therefore the federal statute, such as the forbidding the sale of liquors to them, are dead letters so far as "allotted" Indians are concerned.

Superintendent Buchanan asks for advice as to the methods of enforcing the state law in this particular.

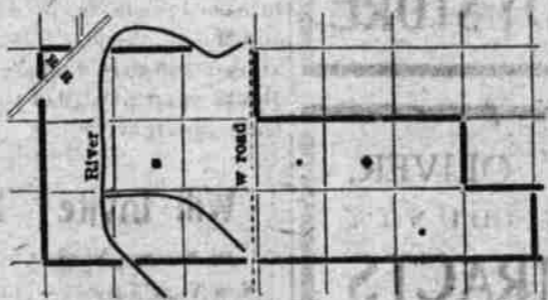

T street from its intersection with Monroe Avenue, to its intersection with Hemlock street; Park street from its intersection with Fourth street, to its intersection with Alder street; First street from its intersection with Grandy Avenue, to its intersection with T street; N street from its intersection with Washington Avenue, to its intersection with Cedar street; Jefferson Avenue from its intersection with Fourth street, to its intersection with Spruce street; Main street from its intersection with Fourth street, to its intersection with Alder street; Second street from its intersection with Grandy Avenue, to its intersection with P street; Washington Avenue from its intersection with Fourth street, to its intersection with M street; Fir and N Fir street from the intersection of Fir with Washington Avenue, to the intersection of N Fir street with Sears street.

Be it further resolved, that the City Recorder cause this resolution to be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of La Grande, and that he keep on file in his office, for the inspection of interested persons, the field notes of the City Engineer making such survey, adopted by the Council, 12th day of July, 1905.
