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A NEW TRIAL DENIED

Portland July 15—Federal Judge De Haven this afternoon denied Senator Mitchell's motion for a new trial and also the motion to arrest judgment. Defendants attorneys gave notice that they would file a bill of exceptions for appeal.

Williamson Case

Portland July 15—M R Riggs County commissioner at Prinnville and a co-defendant with congressman Williamson in the land fraud trial admitted under cross examination this morning that the money received by his office to pay filings on many alleged fraudulent entries was in the form of checks signed by the firm of Williamson & Geener.

Powder Explosion

Ottawa Ont., July 15—Four men were killed and several injured by an explosion in the Dominion Cartridge Companies great arsenal at Brownsburg this morning. The dead are Stephen Cruthers, John Martin, Thomas Charles and Napoleon Lamarche.

Car Robbers Arrested

South Bend, Ind., July 15—Officers have arrested 11 men charged with being implicated in wholesale robberies of cars on the Grand Trunk railroad near Stillwell, Laporte county. Merchandise to the value of \$30,000 has been taken.

Former Premier Dies

Madrid, July 15—Marquis Villaverde, former premier of Spain, died here today.

WRECKED TWO HUNDRED HOUSES

Bellevue July 15—Following the anti-Semitic outbreak at Jozefow, in the Lublin Russia, a mob of three thousand attacked Ghetto, wrecking and plundering over two hundred houses. Two persons were killed and one hundred and ten injured.

Lawson in Chicago

Chicago, July 15—Thomas W Lawson arrived in this city this morning at ten fifty five from Albert Lea, Minn in his private car Halmers attached to the Rock Island train. He was met at Jouiet by a committee headed by Clarence Darrow. He will be the guest today and tonight of the Jefferson Club and will be the principal speaker at a banquet to be given in his honor this evening. Mayor Dunne will not be present as he left this morning for a week's outing in Wisconsin. Lawson leaves for Boston immediately at the close of the banquet.

Great Crowds Attracted

Idaho Kan July 15—Thirty five hundred people jammed the Grand Theater in which owing to public interest, the trial of former congressman Fuston is taking place. Former congressman Funston is the father of General Funston. It is claimed that former congressman advocated the dynamiting of saloons prior to the explosion which wrecked several places recently. He was arrested for disturbing the peace and for carrying concealed weapons.

Killed at Baker City

Baker City July 14—James Martin, a switchman in the yards of the Oregon Lumber company, was run over by a switch engine of the Sumpter Valley railroad at noon today and instantly killed. Martin was riding on the front of the engine and fell off, being run over. Deceased was a member of the Odd Fellows and leaves a wife and daughter. No arrangements have been made for the funeral.

WILL NOT VISIT MOSCOW

St Petersburg July 15—The Czar had definitely decided not to go to Moscow July 19th to issue the proclamation convoking the representative association. It is understood that the change plans is due to the assassination of Count Schuyvaloff at Moscow. An imperial decree has been issued granting amnesty to all religious offenders in accordance with the ukase of May 12th.

Fast Train Wrecked

Harrisburg July 15—The Pennsylvania flyer east bound, the new eighteen hour train between Chicago and New York struck a wrecked freight train while running at top speed, west of Port Royal near this city at five o'clock this morning. The freight train had buckled, throwing a car across the passenger track. The flyer struck the car and hurled it from the track. The engineer of the flyer jumped when he saw the obstruction and was severely injured. The engine of the flyer was considerably damaged.

HONORED BY THEIR PRESENCE

Washington D C July 15—The estate of New Hampshire has been granted the honor of entertaining the Russian-Japanese peace plenipotentiaries during the period of their conference at Portsmouth. The envoys with their suites will be lodged at the Hotel Wentworth, one of the most handsome hotels in all New England. No expense will be spared to provide entertainment for the distinguished guests.

GOT IT IN THE NECK

San Jose Cal July 15—Gustave Hueber, a wealthy retired San Francisco paint manufacturer was shot and killed instantly by his wife last night, at their country home above Alma Hueber and his wife had quarreled and he had threatened to kill her, and placed a shot gun at the head of the bed when they retired. Later he got up and reached for the gun. His wife drew a revolver from under the pillow and shot him in the back of the neck. He died instantly.

Wool Cornered

La Crosse, July 15—The wool market of the northwest is practically cornered by S Y Hyde and his associates. Two million pounds are stored here and vast quantities elsewhere. They bought every pound in Wisconsin and have an option on nearly the entire supply in the northwest.

Submarine Raised

Blairstown July 15—French submarine Faradet which sunk with 14 men on board has been raised by means of the floating dock. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

Starts For Washington

Shanghai, July 15—M Pokotoff, the Russian minister to China, sailed today for Vancouver on the steamer Empress of China. He is on his way to Washington D C, to attend the Russian Japanese peace conference.

Soldiers Mutiny

Tiflis, July 14—A regiment of Russian rappers stationed at a small village in the mountains near here, has murdered all of its officers and, it is rumored, has joined the revolutionists.

Unconstitutional

Little Rock, Ark., July 15—The Anti-trust law which passed the last legislature was today declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

SAILS FOR NORTH POLE

New York, July 15—Commander Peary's ship Roosevelt starts for the North Pole at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The Roosevelt intended to sail this afternoon but its departure was delayed by the non-arrival of duplicate machinery.

His Own Executioner

Salt Lake July 15—Fearing capture, Peter Calmont, an Italian shot himself today. The man is believed to be the second burglar who was interrupted while leaving the store at Union with plunder. His companion was shot dead by a boy left to guard him when he showed fight yesterday morning.

Reported Mutiny

Vienna July 15—Dispatches from St Petersburg say that it is rumored there that a mutiny occurred among the crew of the battleship Katherina, of the Black Sea squadron, and it is reported that the mutineers have sunk the vessel.

At the convention of the National Catholic Educational Association, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Dennis J O'Connell, D D, Catholic University, Washington D C, was re-elected president of the general society.

THREE KILLED IN COLLISION

Chicago, July 15—A passenger train from St. Louis on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois railway collided with a suburban train at Stieger, Ill., today. James Lyke, engineer of the suburban train, George Epstein and Ferdinand Hoyn, passengers on the suburban train, were killed and six others received serious injuries. An open switch caused the St. Louis train to dash into the siding where the suburban train was standing.

SHASTA MINES SOLD FOR TWO MILLIONS

Sharon Pa. July 15—The Balakla gold and silver mines of Shasta county California owned by the late Peter Kimberly, Frank Bukie of Sharon and others have sold to a syndicate headed by Clarence W Mackay for \$2,000,000. The deal was closed this week by trustees of the Kimberley estate.

Reinstated

Washington July 15—Secretary of Navy Bonaparte today reversed the order of late Secretary Morton retiring Civil Engineers Walker and Harris from inspection duty at the Charleston dry dock and sent the engineers back to duty. The men were removed at the instigation of the New York continental Jewel Filtration Co. who claimed the engineers treated the company unfairly. Bonaparte complemented engineers Walker and Harris on the conscientious discharge of duty. In the report on case assistant Secretary Darling said the evidence tends to show that without vigorous inspection the work would not be equal that called for in contract.

BOTH COASTS SHAKE

Portland, Maine, July 15—Two slight earthquake shocks were felt here this morning at ten minutes after three. Heavier shocks were felt at Augusta, Bangor, Lewiston and Rock Island. Reports from Thomaston says the shock there was of sufficient duration. The tremor was felt shortly after five o'clock in the morning. Houses were shaken and dishes rattled.

San Bernardino Cal July 15—This afternoon a violent earthquake shook this city. It was the most violent experienced here for years. A building on the corner of 8rd & D street cracked open in seven places, and other damage is feared. Along the mountains clouds of dust following the earthquake tell of serious landslides.

Cyclone Kill Four

Winnipeg July 15—A cyclone swept through this city early this morning and as a result four persons were killed and six injured. The property loss is very heavy. High brick walls of a four story building owned by James Conner crashed down upon two adjoining buildings killing the four inmates and injuring five others. The dead are R White, W Steinhoff and two sisters named Riley. The building which collapsed was recently gutted by fire and the walls had been left standing.
