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## INSULT GIVEN KAISER

The Emperor ordered the vessel out of the harbor and the men responsible for mutiny will be severely punished. The commander was suspended for excessive cruelty.

## JAPANESE ROUT RUSSIAN FORCES

Later the flotilla discovered a concealed patrol and shelled them. The cruiser Chihaya shelled the enemy's guard North of Gehabe, a point on the Northeast of Korea."

## TRUSTEE OFFERS A PLAN

New York, July 19.—In a letter to Attorney Paul Cravan, George Westinghouse, a trustee of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, offers a plan for the management of the society, which he thinks is agreeable to policy holders, and suggests that all shareholders place their shares in the hands of the trustees, with power to vote for an amended section of the charter, providing that the stock consist of five thousand shares of twenty dollars each. It is also asked and suggested that all directors be policy holders of one share only, to be held by a single person who is a policy holder.

## WRECK KILLS TRAMP

Reports received here last night are to the effect that a freight train coming into Umatilla from the west yesterday afternoon was wrecked at the west end of the bridge, just at the west end of the yards. The train ran into a switch that was defective, or had not been set right, and the engine and six cars were derailed. The engine turned over, but the fireman and engineer escaped injury by jumping. The trucks of a car were thrown over the embankment of the river and fell upon a tramp who was sleeping under the bridge, killing him instantly. The name of the unfortunate man is not known at the present time. The six cars derailed are pretty badly smashed and passenger traffic was delayed for six hours on account of clearing the tracks.

The five dead identified are Charles Brown, Luke Miller, Gus Bloom, Henry Jocelyn and W. Latimer.

## NO RELIEF FROM THE HEAT WAVE

New York, July 19.—Today was another scorcher in New York and vicinity and no relief from the torrid weather is in sight. Long before sunrise the police were reporting deaths and prostrations, when twenty deaths and two hundred and fifty prostrations were reported. Three deaths were reported up to nine o'clock this morning. Every hospital in the city is crowded and the police patrols are being used as ambulances. The temperature of the weather bureau at nine o'clock was eighty four degrees.

Seventeen deaths from heat were reported during the forenoon, and the temperature was ninety one at eleven o'clock.

Twenty eight deaths have been reported since midnight from heat. A heavy rainstorm broke over the city at three this afternoon, affording temporary relief.

## THE JURY NOT YET AGREED
