Negro Arrested

Yesterday Jim Bramlet, a negro
 boy who has been shining shoes and
 acting as porter in the old Kirtley bar-
 ber shop on Depot street, was arrested
 on a charge of assault with a deadly
 weapon. Marshal Rayburn arrested
 the offender and he was carried before
 Justice of the Peace John E Hough.
 It appears that the negro became en-
 raged because a man by the name of
 Fred Miller had spoken to the proprie-
 tor of a saloon about a job of cleaning
 up, which the negro then held. Fol-
 lowing the instincts of his race, (hav-
 ing no razor at the time), he as-
 sulted Miller with a knife. Miller was
 astute enough to keep out of the way
 of the weapon until the negro was
 stopped. After an investigation of the
 charge, the Justice held the negro to
 answer before the grand jury of the
 circuit court in the sum of \$300.00
 Failing to give this bail, the defend-
 ant was committed to jail.

**RAILWAY MUST
 PAY FULL FEES**

Olympia Wash July 20—Vice-presi-
 dent O M Levy has transmitted \$10 to
 the state labor commissioner with the
 request that the machine shops of the
 Northern Pacific Railroad company at
 various points in this state be inspec-
 ted under the new factory inspection
 law.

The attorney general has ruled that
 one fee will not cover the inspection of
 several plants, even though owned by
 the same company or person and lo-
 cated in the same vicinity. The Nor-
 thern Pacific has machine shops at
 Tacoma, Spokane, Ellensburg, South
 Bend and other places, and instead of
 costing the road \$10 it is said it will
 cost nearer \$300 to comply with the
 terms of the law.

Child Dies of Exposure

Ephrata Washington July 20—The 4
 year old son of Herman Gross, a far-
 mer living six miles north of here,
 wandered from home yesterday morn-
 ing while his parents were in town,
 having left the child in care of his
 sister, 12 years of age.

At 6 o'clock this morning a party of
 60 from the village here took up the
 search, finding the lifeless body of the
 child at 6 o'clock this evening about
 two miles from his home. The little
 fellow has succumbed to fatigue and
 exposure.

Crop Prospect

Edward A Beals in his weekly crop
 Bulletin No 15 dated July 18 1905, in
 charge of the Oregon Section of the U
 S Department of Agriculture Portland
 Oregon in his general summary of crop
 conditions in Oregon says:

"The past week was cool, with con-
 siderable cloudiness and some rain,
 which occurred principally in the coast
 counties and the northern portion of
 the Willamette valley. The weather
 generally, however, was ideal for hay-
 ing and the ripening of grain. The
 bulk of the hay crop has now been se-
 cured in excellent condition, and the
 yields nearly everywhere were above
 the average. Fall wheat harvest has
 begun, and the harvesting of barley
 is progressing rapidly. These crops
 promise to be unusually good. Spring
 wheat is heading and filling nicely,
 and oats show considerable improve-
 ment since the last report. Hop lic
 are numerous and a great deal of spray-
 ing was done during the week. Gar-
 dens, potatoes, field onions, and corn
 are making satisfactory advancement.
 Berries continue plentiful in the mar-
 kets, but apples, peaches, pears, plums
 and prunes, although doing well now,
 promise yields smaller than usual."

Mr John W Minnack of Union, this
 county, is quoted in said bulletin as
 saying, following crop conditions in
 Union county:—Weather hot; ground
 getting dry and hard; range grass dried
 up; stock in fine condition; hay crop
 not up to the standard; spring grain
 ripening too fast; winter wheat and
 barley beginning to color for harvest;
 fruit is dropping badly; gardens good;
 water getting low in all the runways."

 aged 8 years, son of Dwight Allen, was
 reported missing from his home at 9
 o'clock last night, and up to a late
 hour the police had not been advised
 of his return. The lad is described as
 being of light complexion, freckled,

 black-pantalons and wearing a gray
 cap.

Aged Chaplain Dead

Delaware July 20—Chaplain George
 W Collier, U. S. A., retired, is dead
 in this city, aged 80 years. He was
 chaplain in chief of the republic on the
 staff of General John A Logan.

Northwest News

Dr Louis J Wolff of Silverton is the
 surgeon on the new Peary Arctic ex-
 pedition, which sailed on the Roosevelt
 July 16. He is 30 years old and a
 graduate of the San Francisco College
 of Surgery.

At Glendale Ore, Frank Nelson a
 logger, was killed by a log being
 drawn by a donkey engine swinging
 around, crushing him against a tree.
 He was 30 years old and leaves a wife
 and two small children.

Anton Lingschelt, aged 30, was
 found at Helena Mont, with his skull
 crushed by an ax. No clue to the mur-
 derer. The deed is supposed to have
 been done to secure Lingschelt's wages
 for a month.

John Crews, aged 20 years, insane,
 shot his father at Ophir, Curry coun-
 ty, in an attempt to kill him. The
 old man's activity and presence of
 mind saved his life. His leg was bad-
 ly shattered between the knee and hip.

President Eugene F Burt of the Pa-
 cific Baseball league, has only a few
 chances for his life. He lies at his
 home at San Francisco with a pistol
 wound in his left lung. His family
 and the police are satisfied that it was
 an attempt at suicide, but Burt will
 not talk.
