THE GOAT TEAM FOR PORTLAND

Mr. V. Edwards, who lives just on the outskirts of this city, will leave Monday with his goat team for the Lewis and Clark fair at Portland. Mr. Edwards will drive 4 goats, attached to a buggy especially constructed for this purpose, from this city and will distribute advertising matter along his route. Mr. Edwards is an experienced hand in this kind of business, having driven from Lincoln Nebraska to Salt Lake City, Utah, with a goat team in the same buggy he now intends to use in going to Portland. The goats which he will drive to Portland are newly trained, he having secured them only a short time ago. Mr. Edwards states that he has had amazing success in training the goats, and any one who has seen him with the team on the streets of this city can verify this assertion, for he has the goats under perfect control, and the celerity with which he has trained them is remarkable. There is no doubt but that the goat team will create a sensation at the exposition and that many curious eyes will gaze upon it and its owner with interest and admiration. This manner of advertising has been used often before, and Mr. Edwards will no doubt make a success of his present undertaking.

Destructive Mania

Walla Walla July 21— "Jack the Acid Thrower", the smooth individual who has spread terror in the business district through the wanton destruction of clothing with acid, bobbed up again this morning and ruined a coat for Thomas Meckleson, bookkeeper for the Northwestern Gas & Electric company. Mr. Meckleson rubbed against the individual during a trip to the postoffice this morning.

Upon returning to his office Mr. Meckleson's attention was called to some foreign substance on the back of his coat. An examination revealed the fact that a spray of acid had struck the coat completely ruining the garment. The acid had evidently been sprayed upon the garment with a hand syringe.

"Jack the Acid Thrower", first came into prominence last Friday during the fire at the Hotel Duquesne. Several persons who stood about the burning building afterward complained that clothing had been ruined by some kind of acid. The police have taken up the search and the culprit may soon be in custody.

WILL TAKE OVER GARRISONS

Victoria July 21—An Ottawa dispatch says the Imperial government has agreed to taking over the Esquimalt and Halifax garrisons under the terms proposed by Canada. Notice To Water Consumers

All persons knowing themselves to be in arrears for city water are hereby notified to call at the office of the city Recorder and settle at once. In order that there may be no misunderstanding we cite the customer to the following section of the city ordinance. This ordinance will be in force.

Section 28—The water rates shall be payable in advance at the office of the water superintendent on the first day of each month (except for meters which are payable on the first day of the succeeding month), and if not paid within the first ten days the water will be shut off the premises, as provided in Sections 26 and 27.

Later ordinance provides that water rates shall be payable to City Recorder instead of Water Superintendent.

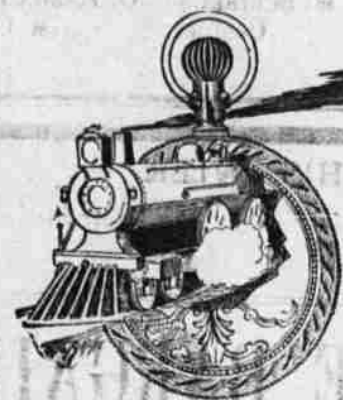
