One Cent Postal Route

Washington July 22—Auditor McCurdy of the postoffice department, today signed the smallest government warrant ever issued in payment of services actually rendered. It was for one cent and will pay for the delivery of mail over a postal route in New Hampshire for a period of four years.

The warrant was made in the order of Adriel L. Stuart of Freedom, N.H. who was the lowest bidder for the contract for carrying mail from that town to a village seven and one half miles distant. The terms of the contract call for a daily service except Sunday, so that Stuart was required to cover 15 miles six days a week.

Flood Disaster

Seattle July 22—A dispatch from Valdez Alaska says a portion of that place was washed into the sea today by a flood. This is the second time in a month that a flood has swept down from the Valdez glacier. Many buildings and dwelling houses were swept away. The warm weather of the past four or five weeks has melted the snow in the mountains back of Valdez and the water has rushed down the valley over the Valdez glacier, cutting a channel through the heart of the city.

Two Records Broken

Ogden, Utah July 22—Two world's records were broken at the saucer track Thursday. Jack Hume ran the mile unpaced, in 2:00 2/5 beating the former record of 2:02 3/5 made by W. H. Wahrenberger at New York in August 1799.

S. H. Wilcox lowered the three quarter mile unpaced amateur record from 1:37 to 1:33 3/5. The previous three quarter mile record was made by E. F. Stove at Springfield Mass in October 1899.

Insane Asylum Tragedy

Traverse City, Mich July 22—Mrs. Mary Larkins a patient at the state insane asylum here, was murdered today by Mrs. Ernestine Berge, another patient, while the attendant was absent from the room. Mrs. Berge after killing Mrs. Larkins quietly walked to her own bedroom. Both women were victims of suicidal mania.

For Deepening Harbor

Honolulu July 22—Lieutenant Slatery of the United States engineer corps today opened the bids for deepening Honolulu harbor. One and a half million cubic yards of material are to be removed. The San Francisco Bridge company is the lowest bidder, its figures being 24.87 cents per cubic yard. Lieutenant Slatery will recommend to the government that this bid be accepted. The appropriation for the work is \$400,000.

461 Surrendered

Tokio July 21—It is officially announced that the Russians who have thus far surrendered at various points of Shakhalin island number 461, including 1 colonel and 14 other officers.

Notice To Water Consumers

All persons knowing themselves to be in arrears for city water are hereby notified to call at the office of the city Recorder and settle at once. In order that there may be no miss under standing we cite the customer to the following section of the city ordinance. This ordinance will be in force.

Section 28—The water rates shall be payable in advance at the office of the water superintendent on the first day of each month (except for meters which are payable on the first day of the succeeding month), and if not paid within the first ten days the water will be shut off the premises, as provided in Sections 26 and 27.

Later ordinance provides that water rates shall be payable to City Recorder instead of Water Superintendent.
