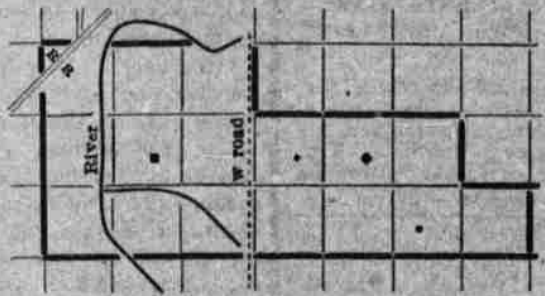

SWEEDISH CABINET RESIGNS

Stockholm, Sweden, July 25.—Following the report of a special committee appointed by the Riksdag to deal with the Norwegian crisis, the Swedish cabinet today resigned. The committee declared unanimously that the Government bill cannot be accepted in the form presented to the Riksdag. It is proposed that the Riksdag will signify its willingness to negotiate with Norway for a dissolution of the union, if the Norwegian requests or the Norwegian people declare by plebiscite in favor of such a dissolution.

RECOMMEND LOAN
The committee recommended that, in the event of a dissolution, Sweden insist on a neutral zone between the two countries, in which there would be no fortifications and that the transit be unobstructed; that Sweden be freed from responsibility for Norway to other states. It was also recommended that a loan of twenty five million be made for readjustment of the existing conditions.

UNKNOWN STEAMER IS IN DISTRESS

Eureka Cal July 25.—A large passenger steamer, whose name has not yet been learned, is in distress a quarter of a mile North of here. The passengers are being taken off in small boats and tugs have gone to her relief.

ANOTHER REPORT
Eureka, Cal July 25.—With her captain and crew deserting her, an unknown steamer, believed to be a collier from the North to San Francisco, is ashore at Cape Mendocino. A tug and life saving crew left this morning in response to a message from the cape at 11 a. m. It is stated that three small boats have been launched from the steamer and the men are attempting to reach the light ship stationed off the Cape. The vessel grounded is up on the beach and in no danger of going to pieces. The steamer must have lost her course in a fog during the night.

BARON KOMURA IN NEW YORK

They will prepare plans for meeting President and go over ahead of them. Baron Komura will probably remain in New York about five days. He is somewhat exhausted from his flying trip.

More Yellow Fever

Fort, Morgan Ala, July 25.—Four cases of yellow fever were discovered on the steamer Columbia which arrived Sunday from Panama. The vessel has been sent into quarantine.

MORE DETAILS GIVEN

San Diego, July 25.—The most important statement yet made as to the cause of the explosion on the gunboat Bennington was obtained today from a machinist, by name A. F. Nelson, the only survivor of the engineers. It will be remembered that Capt Young in his report on the trip made from Honolulu to San Diego stated to admiral Goodrich that the boilers were not safe with a pressure exceeding 130 to 135 pounds. Nelson was in charge of the engines when the ship was about to leave and says: "I kept a careful watch of the steam gauge pressure: it went to 140, then dropped back to 130 and the engines were turned over once; the total pressure then was up exactly to 132, and it was at that figure the moment when the explosion occurred."

SUPPLY SHIPS ARRIVES

The supply ship Iris arrived this morning from Mars Island with three sets of diving apparatus and four men from the submarine service to be employed as divers. They will go down to inspect the plates of the Bennington and determine the advisability of repairs. The officers now believe that the ship can be repaired. No new deaths of the victims of the disaster have been reported today, but three of the injured are in a very serious condition.

Yellow Fever Deaths

Washington July 25.— Surgeon White of the marine hospital service at New Orleans, reports eight deaths of yellow fever and that over a hundred actual cases now exist in New Orleans. The health officers in the Southern cities are investigating every suspicious case.
