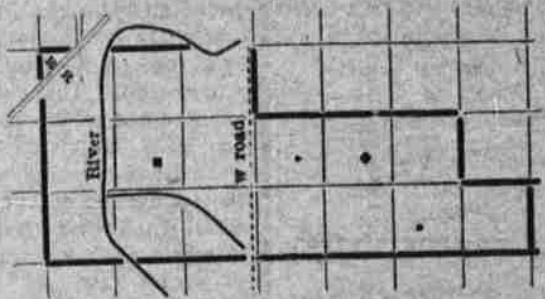

## CARTER'S RESIGNATION REFUSED

Oyster Bay July 26—A consideration of Hawaiian affairs occupied President Roosevelt's attention for several hours Monday. He had as a guest for luncheon and during the greater part of the afternoon, George B. Carter, governor of Hawaii. Governor Carter came to Oyster Bay determined to resign his official position to escape the annoyance to which he has been subjected since he succeeded Sanford B. Dole as governor. The president not only declined to accept his resignation, but told him to go back to Honolulu and he should have the full support and sympathy of the national administration.

Governor Carter was in a much happier frame of mind after his interview with the president than he had been before. He will take a much needed vacation, probably in this country, for several weeks. When he returns to Honolulu it will be to resume his official duties with new confidence and vigor.

"I advised President Roosevelt," said Governor Carter after his conference, "to accept my resignation but he declined to take my advice. On the contrary he advised me to withdraw my resignation and I decided to take his advice. That is the whole story in a nutshell."

## Body Is Found

Bakersfield Cal July 26—A three weeks' search by relatives for a trace of John P. Belshaw, cousin of State Senator C. W. Belshaw of Contra Costa county, who left his home in Riverside on the fifth of this month to arrange for opening a mercantile business in Antioch, has been ended by the finding of the body in a railway culvert near Rosamond. An inquest has been held and the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death by falling from a railway train.

## THE JUDGE'S SENTENCE

Portland, Ore., July 26.—In pronouncing sentence upon the aged United States Senator John H. Mitchell yesterday, Judge DeLavan said:

"The statute under which the indictment was found provides that the offense shall be punished by imprisonment of not more than two years or by a fine of not more than \$10,000. It also renders the defendant incapable of again holding any office of trust or profit in the United States. As I construe the language of the statute the punishment must be both fine and imprisonment, but the court is given great latitude in fixing the amount of fine or imprisonment. The court may make the punishment merely nominal. In pronouncing judgment it is not my purpose to comment upon the evidence or the verdict found by the jury. In reaching a conclusion in the case, I have given consideration to the age of the defendant, which may be taken into account in mitigation of punishment, and the further fact that he is forever hereafter disqualified from holding office.

"In view of these facts and in consideration of the nature of the offense the judgment of the court is that the defendant be imprisoned for six months in the county jail of Multnomah county, in this state, and that he be fined in the sum of \$1000."
