TO MEET
AUG 6

Washington, July 27.—It was definitely announced at the State Department this morning that the first meeting of the Russian and Japanese peace envoys would take place on August 6, on board the May Flower, off Oyster Bay. The President will entertain the envoys at luncheon, instead of at dinner, as was at first arranged.

The peace plenipotentiaries will come to this place on Government warships on August 6 and be received by the President on board the May Flower at one thirty in the afternoon.

Baron Komura, accompanied by minister Takahira, at twelve twenty today and drove to Sagamore Hill. The afternoon will be spent in a conference with President Roosevelt, and they will return to New York at four thirty.

Strict Quarantines

The conspiracy failed because the crew of the Kruiz Potemkin acted hastily. The discovery of the conspiracy resulted in the arrest of twenty five hundred sailors and soldiers, who will be tried for treason.

FIGHT FOR ROOM

At the conclusion of the sitting of the congress, memorial services in honor of Herzl were held in the synagogue. All the delegates could not get in the entrance and a fight ensued for seats. The police were unable to cope with the fighting crowd and a brigade of the fire department dispersed them with hose and water.

HEARTLESS CLERK
DENIES MOTHER

New York, July 27.—James Foye, a confidential clerk for Charles G. Gates, who used the arrest of his own mother yesterday because she stopped him while going into the Waldorf Astoria, and begged him to support her, today showed no signs of relenting from what seems to be an inhuman attitude. He said: "I do not recognize her as my mother. I know her only as my father's divorced wife." He further said that he believed that his mother was crazy and that he did not want to be bothered with her, and that if she came around again, he would have her arrested. The woman lives in a bare little room on Park Avenue, is ill and poverty stricken.
