A STEAMER FROM
FEVER DISTRICT

New York 31.—The Southern Pacific steamer, Precious, arrived at quarantine this morning from New Orleans. All were well and the crew is now allowed short liberty. When the passengers embarked, they were examined by physicians from the board of health, and the history of their movements while in the city was recorded, and all from untraced or suspicious districts, and all steerage passengers were refused. Ninety six out of passengers passed, while five from the Italian quarters were rejected.

OFFICERS QUARANTINE

Mobile Ala July 31.—Although the Governor has not issued a proclamation of quarantine against Louisiana, the officers here are enforcing it.

TWELVE NEW CASES

New Orleans July 31.—Twelve new cases of yellow fever were reported at noon today, but there are no deaths. Mississippi still refuse to allow any person to come into that state from New Orleans without a health certificate.

SHOT GUN QUARANTINE

New Orleans, July 31.—Shot gun quarantines are extending and a number of towns of Louisiana and Mississippi are isolated. A large majority of the cases continue to be in the old district below Canal Street, and the feeling grows more hopeful.

MONEY IS RAISED

New Orleans, La., July 31.—Several thousand dollars have been raised for relief of the sufferers from fever and the effects of the quarantine, and for work in the prevention of the spread of the disease. While admitting the seriousness of the situation, the authorities believe that the disease can now be controlled.

THOUSANDS LOST

Mobile, Ala. July 31.—The railroad quarantine put on Mississippi will cost thousands to the merchants and to the railroads. Lawlor and Harrisburg Miss. have notified the railroad officials not to sell tickets to those points and to run trains through at thirty miles per hour.
