## WILL BE NO WHITE WASHING

San Diego Aug 3—"I can assure you that there will be no white washing in any particular in these proceedings," was the statement of admiral Goodrich, made this morning in referring to the investigation by the board of inquiry with reference to the cause of the Bennington explosion. "Either the Solace or the Hancock will be ordered here to take the convalescent to the Mare Island hospital. The Chicago and Bennington will remain until that time. There are no new deaths and the patients are doing well."

On the occasion referred to so judicious was his treatment of his subject, so interesting his way of putting it and so pungent and forcible his delivery that the audience was thoroughly absorbed during every moment of the address."

Tucker, as principal, Miss Wilkerson, of High-valley and Miss Eva Nell, of La Grande as teachers for the next nine months term of school commencing the first Monday in September.
