THE MONROE DOCTRINE

The emphasis which president Roosevelt placed upon the Monroe Doctrine in his speech delivered on last Friday renders it important to know what that doctrine is and where and how it originated.

James Monroe the fifth president of the U S in his seventh annual message to congress, Dec 2 1823, used the following language. "In the wars of the European powers in matters relating to themselves we have never taken any part, nor does it comport with our policy so to do. It is only when our rights are invaded or seriously menaced that we resent injuries or make preparation for our defense. With the movements in this hemisphere we are of necessity more immediately connected, and by causes which must be obvious to all enlightened and impartial observers. The political system of the allied powers is essentially different in this respect from that of America. This difference proceeds from that which exists in their respective Governments; and to the defense of our own, which has been achieved by the loss of so much blood and treasure, and matured by the wisdom of their most enlightened citizens, and under which we have enjoyed unexampled felicity, this whole nation is devoted. We owe it, therefore, to candor and to the amicable relations existing between the United States and those powers to declare that we should consider any attempt on their part to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere as dangerous to our peace and safety. With the existing colonies or dependencies of any European power we have not interfered and shall not interfere. But with the Governments who have declared their independence and maintained

it, and whose independence we have, on great consideration and on just principals, acknowledged, we could not view any interposition for the purpose of oppressing them, or controlling in any other manner their destiny, by any European power in any other light than as the manifestation of an unfriendly disposition toward the United States."

Elsewhere in the same message President Monroe took occasion to declare, "that the American continents, by the free and independent condition which they have assumed and maintain, are henceforth not to be considered as subjects for future colonization by any European powers."

The foregoing gives the Monroe Doctrine as official records have preserved it. See pages 209 and 218 vol. II "Messages of Presidents" published by authority of Congress.
