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"JAPAN MUST RESPECT RUSSIA AS RUSSIA RESPECTS JAPAN" SO DECLARES ENVOY WITTE

"Defeated but Not Vanquished. If Necessary Could Carry on War for Years"

SUBJECTS TO A RESTRICTED NAVY

Portsmouth, Aug. 18.—It was announced when the peace envoys left for the conference this morning that when they adjourned after the present session they will not meet again until Monday. This is for the purpose of giving the secretaries time to catch up with the records.

The commissioners are beginning to show signs of fatigue. They worked until 2 o'clock this morning and arose at 7 when they studied the digest of several days proceedings before they hurried to breakfast. The Russian envoy, M. Witte, has set a strenuous pace for the members of the suites.

Portsmouth, Bulletin Aug. 18.—At 12:45 Korosovitz telephoned from the navy yard "Sitting of the envoys this morning article XI was discussed and not yet finished. Will resume at 3 o'clock this afternoon." Article XI concerns the limitation of Russian naval strength in the far east.

RUSSIANS OBJECT

Portsmouth Aug. 18.—The Japanese proposal to restrict the future naval armament of Russia in the Pacific ocean which is up for discussion today is the question the Russians are especially considering. They maintain that such a course would be humiliat-

ing. The news from the conference indicates that the discussion exceeds in earnestness and plain talk that of any previous session. Mr. Witte is particularly vigorous in his denunciation of Japanese attitude on this point, and emphasized his words with frequent gestures and bringing his flat down upon the table often, and would rise from his chair and walk up and down the room so as to gain more freedom of his expression to enable him in a measure to suppress his intense feeling under which he is laboring. It is understood that he characterized this demand as unreasonable and particularly humiliating in view of the recent disastrous battle lost to Japan by which the flower of the Russian navy was sent to the bottom of the sea. Witte's voice broke as he pointed out how it would require years for Russia to build her navy to be any where near the position she was before the war, and declared that it would at least be a generation before she could prove a menace to Japan. "Russia was defeated," he declared, "but was not vanquished. She is bowed down but can continue her military operations for years if necessary. If peace is to come out of these negotiations,

Japan must respect Russia, as Russia respects Japan". Komura, the Japanese envoy, listened with stoical silence and impassive countenance, and in response denied that Japan had any desire to humiliate Russia or exact terms that the world would consider unreasonable.

ADJOURNED

This afternoon the peace conference adjourned shortly after four.

DIVERS LOOK UPON AN AWFUL SCENE

Car Load of Men Women and Children Drowned Like Rats

OVER NINETY ENTOMED

Norfolk, Aug. 18.—Up to ten o'clock this morning eighteen bodies have been recovered from the wreck of the excursion train at Bruce station yesterday. Most of the victims are negroes.

AWFUL DISCOVERY

Norfolk Aug. 18 Bulletin—A deep water diver was sent into the river at the scene of the Atlantic railroad wreck, where the excursion train yesterday went through a draw bridge and two coaches plunged into the river, and states that he found one car of dead men, women and children who were drowned like rats in a trap. He states that there are over ninety in the car and that the scene in the bottom of the river is the worst that he ever witnessed. The work of taking the dead from the river is now progressing with the use of a derrick.

MOSTLY NEGROES

The divers found that most of the people in the car at the bottom of the river contained negroes and are drawing them to the surface with ropes one by one. The number of dead is now thought to exceed 75.

The railroad had no list of the passengers on the train so it may never be known who perished. The cause of the wreck is now thought

to have been caused by the raising of the drawbridge which precipitated the cars into the water.
