Hood River Suicide

Hood River Or Aug. 18—Albert McCamey, a farmer, of the Mount Hood district, 30 miles south of here up the Hood river valley, shot himself last night, dying several hours later. Details are very slight so far and no cause is known. A Hood River physician who went to Mt. Hood this morning, has not returned, and the coroner has not investigated. McCamey was 40 years old, and a highly respected citizen. He is said to have been a witness in the case of Frank Rice, accused of the murder of James Foss, near Mount Hood.

WILL BE SOME TIME YET

Walla Walla and Lewiston continually talk of the building of the main line of the O. R. & N. railway down the Snake river from Huntington to Lewiston, and on to Portland via Walla Walla and a water grade, thus leaving Pendleton a deserted country village on a branch line from Huntington to Umatilla.

It is kind in Pendleton's energetic rivals to leave the branch line across the blue mountains in operation to handle the traffic of Grand Ronde and Umatilla county, otherwise we should be compelled to go to Umatilla or Cold Springs to reach a railroad.

In the first place it is 180 miles farther from Huntington to Portland by way of Lewiston down the Snake, than it is by way of La Grande and Pendleton. In the second place over half of that 180 miles would be absolutely non-producing, as it is a rocky mountain gorge through which a railroad could not be built without burrowing through solid rock walls most of the way.

A branch line of the O. R. & N. now projected through Walla to Lewiston would reach all the traffic that would be reached by the road down the river, excepting a little perhaps, in the vicinity of the Seven Devils, which can be reached by a branch line from either Baker City or Huntington through Eagle and Pine valleys such a branch now being in contemplation.

And the last and most convincing argument against the intention of the O. R. & N. to change its main line from the true mountain route to the Snake river line, is the fact that enormous expenditures have been made in making the mountain grades, tracks, tunnels, bridges and buildings permanent and modern.

Were a main line run down the Snake in contemplation, \$100,000 would not be appropriated for improvements in the mountain division, including the laying of 90 pound steel rails, the replacing of all wooden bridges with modern steel structures, the widening and renewing of all the tunnels along the line and the ballasting of the track with two feet of gravel hauled great distances at heavy expense.

Pendleton, La Grande and Baker City will remain main line points for all time to come. They are in no peril from Portland newspaper railroad builders.—East Oregonian.

I. A. Gale of Union was a La Grande visitor today.

J. P. Bonnett, of Summerville, was in the city this afternoon. Mr. Bonnett states that harvesting is in full progress in the Summerville district, and that the yields are turning out even better than was expected.

Mrs. B. R. Porter and daughter, Miss Lina Burl, left last evening for Sedalia Mo., after spending three months visiting their daughter and sister Mrs. L. D. Reavis. They also visited the exposition and the coast while in Oregon.

The O. R. & N. is installing a fifteen horse power engine at Kamela to furnish the electric power for the new block signal system which has just been constructed between here and Bingham springs at a cost of about \$60,000. This will eliminate the possibility of collisions over this piece of road which is considered one of the most dangerous pieces on the system on account of the heavy mountain grades.
